### Some of Morris's Inconsistencies.

According to the reports in the Daily News, Sir Edward Morris was at Woods' Island and Bonne Bay on Tuesday and Wednesday of this week. The report of his reception being cordial at these places may with confidence be discounted.

Outside the official galvanizers and party rooters, it is highly improbable that the people at large would show any cordiality towards him, and moreover we know that similar reports of his reception in the district of Burgeo and Le Poile and at points of call on his return by the S. S. Glencoe along the south coast were imaginary for the most part and exaggerated for the rest. The attack on the policy of the late administration in regard to Americans is only what might have been expected of the leader of the Tories who was responsible for the campaigns of 1908 and 1909.

For over seven years Sir Edward Morris was a member of the Bond Administration. From the spring of 1906 to the middle of the summer of 1907, he took part in all the acts of that administration. He was a member of the Executive Council and as such planned and deliberated upon and was a party to all the legislation which that Government introduced in the House. He spoke in favour of the legislation, voted for it, and defended it when it was attacked, yet he was a party to all the attacks made on the legislation and administration after he severed his connection with the Liberal Party. He was a party to the Foreign Fishing Vessels legislation of 1905 and 1906, and he was a party to the Modus Vivendi fight, yet he is now attacking his own acts in order, if possible, to score a point locally off Sir Robert Bond. As John Alexander Robinson said in the Banner of Progress in 1904, when he was attacking his present leader, Sir Edward Morris, there is a great gulf fixed between the partisan politician and the statesman. Sir Edward is a partisan politician of the most pronounced type

and he is ready at all times to return like a dog to his own vomit. He is consistent in being steadily and constantly inconsistent.

On March 9th, 1903, in regard to what has been dubbed "The Secret Letter," he declared the letter "had nothing to do with creating" any liability. "The letter so much spoken of had no influence whatever upon the arbitrators." "There was nothing concealed from the people of this Colony in the Legislature."

Mr. C. H. Emerson in the same debate said "There was no such thing as a secret letter." Yet at the time of the elections of 1908 and 1909, Sir Edward Morris circulated a pamphlet which contained this paragraph, advocating that Bond should be defeated.

"Because of the notorious Secret Letter which Bond suppressed when he was bringing the 1901 Contract before the Legislature and the existence of which he denied when questions respecting it were asked in both Houses. This secret letter cost the Colony a million and a quarter dollars, which we need never have paid Reid had it not been in existence."

Sir Edward declared in the House of Assembly that "the short line route would be the first real attempt to provide a rapid means of communication between this country and the old world." He talked of 100,000 quintals of fish being sent away in cold storage by means of it.

After he left the Liberal Party he attacked the scheme and threw ridicule on it.

In the same speech, he spoke of the effect of carrying out the scheme on the Bay of Islands herring fishery. He said: "Supposing we had a system there capable of handling the whole of that herring fishery. And supposing these magnificent fish could be sent fresh into the American and Canadian markets, it required very little argument from him to point out the value of such a system to the fishermen of that district."

In spite of this, however, he has been doing nothing since then but throwing cold water on the scheme of the Short Line to connect up Bay of Islands and Bonne Bay with the American continent to give a better chance for these herring fishermen to dispose of their catch.

Sir Edward Morris talks of promoting Agriculture on the West Coast. Yet the chief thing he has done in regard to the West Coast has been to waste the Agricultural money in providing \$1,800 a year for the member for St. George's and to pay him the expenses he has incurred in travelling around.

He talks of Bond declaring war on the Americans on the West Coast, yet he himself was a party to what was done. As Attorney General he was in charge of the prosecution of the two fishermen under the Bait Act, which was instituted to carry out the policy and he made a long speech on the Modus Vivendi in defence of the policy of the Government.

Turning now to more recent inconsistencies, we may mention three of them:

First—there is his declaration that the Branch Railways were to be paid out of the first loan of \$800,000 sterling and his flotation of a second loan of \$400,000 for the same purpose.

Second—there is his statement that he had never an interest in any timber limits, in spite of the fact that

there is a record showing his possession of \$40,000 in a company owning such limits.

Third—there is his promise to relieve the country of heavy taxation by placing the prime necessities of life on the free list, and the fact that his government has put through four budgets without any attempt to carry out his promise.

He is promising a great extension of public works in Bonne Bay. It is said \$10,000 was sent down by the Board of Works there to be spent on such works. He may hope to reconcile the people to his inconsistencies, his timber givings out, his extravagances generally, by spending large sums of public monies, but we venture to predict that the people will not be influenced by it to support his government at the next election. They know that they must eventually pay through the nose for it and that the sooner the career of the Morris Government is brought to a close the better for the country.

Efforts were made yesterday to try and float the Wilhelmina off the dock in order to discharge her enormous cargo of deal, but were unsuccessful owing to rapidly gusting winds blowing through the holes in the bottom of the ship. In consequence temporary repairs will necessarily have to be made before the ship can unload.

The barq. Minnie, Capt. Wakeham, reached port at noon to-day after a 22 days passage from Barbados, bringing a cargo of molasses to Goodridge & Sons. Yesterday and last night a heavy storm was experienced at sea and the vessel got a bad drubbing. The wind blew with hurricane force, accompanied by rain showers, but the vessel avoided mishap.

There is still no news as to the whereabouts of John Green, and search parties are abandoning hopes of finding him. It is not correct, as stated by the Chronicle, that messages have been sent to Glasgow to ascertain if Mr. Green had left here on the Sardinian. Even if he did take passage on the ship the Allan Line agents here would have knowledge of it.

The Red Cross Liner Florizel, Capt. Smith, entered port at press hour from New York via Halifax. She left the latter place at 4 p.m. on Tuesday and had a stormy trip, getting the full force of last night's gale. A wireless message was received at noon saying that at 8.30 a.m. to-day the ship was off Cape Race in a dense fog and would probably arrive at 2.30 p.m.

### Supreme Court.

IN CHAMBERS.  
Before the Chief Justice.

In the matter of the petition of A. D. McIsaac of Grand River, praying that E. J. Malloy of St. John's, Grocer, be declared insolvent. Mr. Emerson for petition states facts of case. H. J. Brownrigg was sworn and examined by Mr. Emerson, and cross examined by Mr. Higgins and Mr. Fenelon, who appeared for Mr. Brownrigg and Franklin & Co. respectively. Mr. Emerson asked for petitioners' cost to be paid out of the Estate. Mr. Higgins asked for attaching creditors costs to be paid out of the Estate.

It was ordered that E. J. Malloy be declared insolvent and that the costs of the petitioner and the attaching creditors be paid out of the Estate.

### A Plucky Act.

This forenoon Mrs. Power of Torbay was seated in her carriage near the Bank of Montreal, when her horse, which is a young beast, became frightened by an automobile and bolted. The animal ran across the street at a furious rate, while the woman stood up in the vehicle and pluckily held on to the reins, endeavouring to bring the horse up. Just opposite the Furness Withy Line office the wagon collided with a telegraph pole. The woman's head struck it and she was stunned, but still she held the reins tightly and ultimately succeeded in bringing the animal to a standstill. The vehicle was slightly damaged and was brought to a wheel-right for repairs.

### The Police Court.

Three bank fishermen charged with being drunk and disorderly were each fined \$5 or 14 days.

A charge preferred against a chauffeur for dangerous driving was postponed till Saturday morning.

The owner of two unlicensed dogs was fined \$6 or 20 days. He did not appear to the summons.

Another who also did not appear was fined \$3.

Two drunks were discharged.

Two others were fined respectively \$2 or 7 days, and \$1 or 3 days.

A drunk and disorderly who was also charged with maliciously damaging property was sentenced to six months imprisonment.

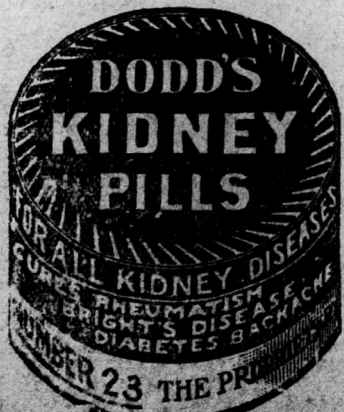
