TURKS RETREAT ON CON-STANTINOPLE-SHORTEST AND MOST REMARKABLE WAR ON RECORD-TUR-KEY MAY SUE FOR PEACE

LONDON, To-day The four days' battle in Thrace has ended in the triumph of the Bulgarians, commanded-in-chief by Gen eral Savoff, whose skilful startegy has probably brought to a chaos one of the shortest most remarkable wars on record. The great Turkish army, esmen is defeated and is in retreat to Constantinople. It is believed to be at the mercy of the victorious Bulgarian army.
