Strong Protest of Board of Trade

AGAINST THE GOVERNMENT.

The adjourned meeting of the Board of Trade took place last night, and the Quarterly Report was adopted.

Mr. Parnell moved its adoption. Hon. John Harvey seconded the motion, and strongly criticized the indifference and apathy of the Government in enforcing the Bait Act the past season. The matter was of vital importance to the staple industry of the country. Next to those in authority, and especially the taking off of the Fiona was a strong inducement to smuggling and bait running. The Act was an old one, and had been enforced for many years, and he thought all present would support fully the Council in its protest against the removal of the cruiser at a time she would be of the utmost service in keeping our bait out of the hands of our foreign competitors. Statements had been made that schooners cleared from Bay of Islands with cargoes of bait under bond and loaded the same aboard of other vessels at Gloucester, without landing it. He also referred to the issuing of clearances out of Bay of Islands and along the coast generally. He understood some masters got certificates showing the cargo to be of U. S. product, and that copy being filed. If such were done, and the Government had no record of knowledge of it, it was most objectionable. The practice was of a more serious nature than appeared at first sight and should be remedied at once. If it existed, as he had been led to believe it did. Records should be kept and available by the proper authorities.

Mr. A. H. McDougall was the next speaker. He was of the opinion that the enforcement of the Act had done much good but the question arose whether it would continue in view of the difficulties of its enforcement. Newfoundland fishermen could compare favourably with outsiders and their products as well. The education referred to in the report was a matter of importance. In his opinion such was imparted in outport schools whereby greater interest would be taken in the catching and curing of fish. With reference to the proposed 1913 Fishery Exhibition. He failed to see where people who are making such wonderful progress were going to learn from us. Our fishing operations are practically confined to the shore. Very little is known of the outside banks. The increase in the Norwegian catch is largely due to the use of motor boats. He advocated that a sum of money should be allocated by the Government for the benefit of the Fisheries.

President Fearn demonstrated that the removal of the revenue boat even though for a short period was harmful and that the case of a vessel arriving at one of our ports, loading 40000 sardines and sailing in the space of 24 hours. No public service to which the ship would be given would make up for such a loss and he had reason to fear that owing to the slack manner in which the Bait Act had been carried out competitors would secure a spring baiting for next year, and it would be difficult to compute the injury that would be done to our fishermen next season by the carrying of this regrettable occurrence. He understood that some of the bonds given for bait were valueless, but if the removal of such were insisted upon, skippers preferred to go without a cargo. A number of these were anything but solid financially. Merchants as well as fishermen, he believed, required education in fishery matters. Antiquated modes of fishing should be abandoned, and he referred to the necessity of consulting the Norwegians in the use of thermometers to determine the temperature of the water and discover the spots where fish will resort owing to favourable conditions of existence. He referred also to the discovery of a bank off the Icelandic Coast where fish were to be found in such abundance that if it was even used as a fertilizer much money would be made off it. It might be that similar grounds exist here, but at present no knowledge of such could be procured. He believed that by the exhibition much valuable knowledge could be gleaned and thought that it would be a good thing to secure the services of a fishing expert for the Colony. The fish and men we have in plenty and the great need now is the knowledge of the best way to catch and cure it.

Mr. F. Moore agreed with the utility and benefit of the enforcement of the Bait Act but deemed it to be nonsensical to speak of the finding of banks and the taking of temperatures. He

LATEST War News

The Collapse of Turkey.

TURKS RETREAT ON CONSTANTINOPLE—SHORTEST AND MOST REMARKABLE WAR ON RECORD—TURKEY MAY SUE FOR PEACE

Special Evening Telegram.

LONDON. To-day. The four days' battle in Thrace has ended in the triumph of the Bulgarians, commanded-in-chief by General Sarrail, whose skillful strategy has probably brought to a chaos one of the shortest most remarkable wars on record. The great Turkish army, estimated at over two hundred thousand men is defeated and is in retreat to Constantinople. It is believed to be at the mercy of the victorious Bulgarian army. A council sitting at the Porte is discussing the advisability of suing for peace.

Turkey declared war. The first week of the campaign closed with the dramatic fall of Kirk Kilissh. Fully feeling for the first time the disorganization, bad morale, indifferent commissariat of the Turkish army. It is believed a peace settlement will be arranged either by the Porte suing for peace or by the intervention of the powers. An interesting question, involving difficult diplomatic problems will immediately arise as to the division of the spoils of war, a question concerning not only the victorious allies but also Russia, Austria Rumania and possibly other powers. The latter are hurrying warships to the various parts of the country to protect foreign residents. It is believed the total Turkish force numbered 250,000 compared with 150,000 Bulgarians.

Believed that temperature did not affect the volume of fish, as he knew of periods when large catches were made by traps put down through the ice. On the contrary, often in warm seasons poor catches resulted.

Mr. W. Moore held that the exhibit would lend but little towards a general improvement, while the same price was paid for good and bad fish. Mr. McDougall spoke next, remarking that a great deal of time was lost toiling and returning from the Labrador, and in a great many instances "returning clean." This, he thought, was due to lack of foresight and knowledge as to where to get the fish. He said fishermen should be educated how to cure fish properly. As to the evil, thought that the man who cures badly reduced the total value of the exports.

Mr. Fearn followed and said that he knew of small catches being taken while fish were plentiful and which effected on the knowledge of the men. He said the work of charting the coast, undertaken by the surveying ship Ellinor, would be of great value. Mr. Moore was of the opinion that even the scientists aboard the Ellinor would fail to get an average catch of our seasons out of the five.

Mr. Fearn concluded by saying that the knowledge of the different grounds could be an advantage and a benefit. According, he said, as one was empty another could be filled. He believed that our fishery could be advanced as well as other industries and that the money so spent would be well spent. The resolution was then put and carried.

Dr. Parkins Addresses C.H.E.

Last evening the Secretary of the Rhodes Scholarship Trust addressed the members of the Council of Higher Education on the working of the Trust. He stated that the Trust had been constrained to insist on these valuable scholarships, and that the monetary value in the world, being assigned to students of at least sophomore standing in Colonial Universities. Newfoundland was the only Colony to which this rule had not yet been applied. Grace had already been extended till 1913, and possibly it might be extended until 1915, if some temporary expedient was resorted to in the meantime to raise the age and standard of scholarship of our scholars. He claimed that the Trust had found by experience that students of nineteen could not receive from Oxford the benefits Rhodes intended, and that to obtain these advantages maturer men must be sent.

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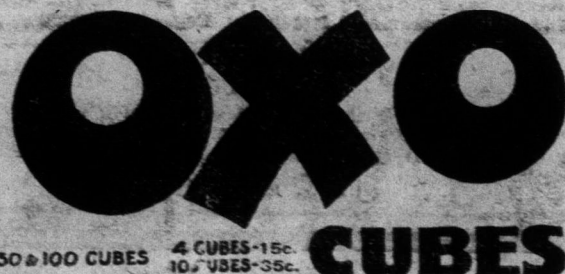
