Last Night's Enthusiastic Liberal Meeting.

LOGY BAY STANDS NOBLY BY THE LIBERAL FLAG—PAYS A TRIBUTE TO THE INVINCIBLE KENT, DWYER AND RYAN.

Another to the long list of successes of the Liberal Party was added last night at Logy Bay, where the Liberal Candidates, Messrs. Kent, Dwyer and Ryan held a most successful meeting. The people of the settlement gave the visitors a right royal and hearty welcome—in fact it was conceded to be a reception that is unique in the history of Logy Bay. The people there always stood nobly by the Liberal cause and that they are going to be equally loyal to the cause this time was amply demonstrated last night.

Every house in and around the settlement was illuminated with candles and varicoloured lights and every man, woman and child turned out and made the hills re-echo by their vigorous cheering; besides there was a display of bonfires and fireworks, amid the continuous firing of guns. On the whole there was a splendid demonstration and a most enthusiastic reception accorded the Liberal candidates. Logy Bay is a unit for the Liberal Party and is not going to listen to those who are in the field seeking the suffrages of the people, mainly the benefit of monopolists. The people are tired of the way they have been treated by the Morris Government and the way our fishermen have been treated by Morris's man (Friday) McGrath, who has insulted and abused the principal producers of this Colony.

The meeting was held in the schoolroom which was filled to overflowing with voters. Outside the building there were gathered women and children to exchange greetings with the doughty Kent, Dwyer and Ryan, whose names are now a household expression throughout Logy Bay. The people there were determined that they were not going to be outdone by other districts in their welcome to the Liberal standard bearers.

The meeting was called to order by one of the most respected residents of the district, who presided and introduced the candidates, Messrs. Ryan, Dwyer and Kent spoke in turn and eclipsed all previous efforts by the forceful, logical and convincing arguments advanced. They showed plainly in various ways how our public monies were not-

oriously and lavishly squandered by the Tory clique. Morris, since his advent to power in 1909 has placed this country under heavy financial obligations. He said the Branch Railways would be built for Four Millions of dollars when they will really cost twelve millions. Morris paid the Reid in gold for their work instead of in debentures, thereby giving them a present of half a million dollars.

The speakers also pointed out the uselessness of Morris's "Agricultural Policy," that has cost the country an enormous amount of money; how our civil service was made a dumping ground for heisters; how most of the public debt on the Colony was caused by trips abroad and other fake schemes of Government members.

Besides paying \$2,200 for two spars that Johnnie Crosbie paid \$28 for. The speakers impressed upon the voters of Logy Bay not to be fooled by scare cries which the Morris crowd will get out. They know that they will have to give account of their stewardship if turned out of power, and will use any tactics to save themselves. Mr. Kent spoke emphatically on the sectarian cry that was being circulated throughout the Eastern district for the main purpose of serving as an election kite for the over-estimated Tory lawyer.

Mr. Kent produced sufficient evidence that there was an immediate apparent change in the sentiment of all present. Whatever little use the people of Logy Bay had for Tories previously, they have none whatever now.

At the close of the meeting a vote of thanks was passed to the Chairman, amid prolonged applause.

On leaving the settlement there was another big demonstration. There was a splendid pyrotechnic display, coupled with vigorous cheering for the Liberal Party and Sir Robert Bond.

The enthusiasm was intense and a splendid sight was presented when the three candidates came along in a carriage drawn by a concourse of stalwarts. On returning to the committee rooms, Mr. H. E. Cowan, who was present, made a brief but effective address. Cheers loud and long were repeatedly given for Kent, Dwyer and Ryan that shook the building. It was the real Liberal cheers showing conclusively that the reign of the Grabbals is at an end, and that it is impossible for

St. John's West!

The interest in the city is centered on the fight which Sir Edward Morris is making against the old spirit of Liberalism that has revived in the West End, and which promises to completely overthrow the Premier and his colleagues, who succeeded under the masquerade of the title "People's Party" in carrying the District four and a half years ago.

In 1909 the personal appeal of Morris, who had represented the West End for so many years, undoubtedly carried the day, but now that four and a half years of power have shown that under the mantle of the "People's Party" the Tory methods of extravagant and irresponsible rule still hold sway, the people have come back to their original and trusty leader, Sir Robert Bond and the wave of Liberal feeling in the West End will bring back Ellis, Cowan and Scott with a majority that will speak with no uncertain sound.

Does Sir Edward Morris imagine for one moment that he is dealing with ignorant, uneducated men? Does he think that they have neither eyes to read nor minds to comprehend?

The District of St. John's West is said to be the worst looked after district in this island. Certainly there has been no labour-giving industry started during the last four years. There are a few, if any, industries in the island that have not started under, and been fostered by the Liberal Party.

The prosperous times that we have enjoyed were possible by the substantial structure of the Bond Party in claiming Newfoundland for Newfoundlanders and though it meant a great deal of money to buy back what Morris and the Tories had given Reid for a son's yet, generations unborn will have cause to bless the name of Bond that reclaimed their heritage.
