How to Start an Auto.

In addition to his other accomplishments, Postmaster Sloan Simpson, of Dallas, Texas, is an authority on starting automobiles, says a dealer. He has prepared the following simple and infallible directions for the guidance of his friends:—

- 1—Remove the spark plugs, empty the carburetor—and crank the engine.
- 2—Sandpaper the fly wheel, take off the commutator—and crank the machine.
- 3—Kick the pub, blow cigarette smoke into the priming cocks—and crank the engine.
- 4—Disconnect the driving shaft, reverse the engine, empty the gasoline tank—and crank the engine.
- 5—Repeat a verse from Koran, tie a wet towel about the cylinders, take off the lubricators—and crank the engine.
- 6—Take the motor entirely apart and put it together with your fingers crossed, drop a quarter into the tank—and crank the engine.
- 7—Crank the engine suddenly without doing anything else. This often surprises it into running.
- 8—Turn your coat inside out, oil the radiator, throw the gasoline strainer at a spectator, stuff a cushion in the fly wheel—and crank the engine.
- 9—Repeat the name of the prophet in Arabia, put a gumdrop in the cylinder, write your candid opinion of all gasoline engines on the windshield roll up your cuffs, connect the battery—and crank the engine.

Insane Man Kills Parents

And Then Commits Suicide.

Hillsburg, Ont., January 28.—Edgar Simpson, 27 years old, son of Hugh Simpson, a farmer, residing on the tenth concession of Garfield, yesterday shot and killed his father and mother and later, a fife r barricading himself in the house and defying a posse of the neighbours who surrounded the residence (waded the rifle with which he had committed the

deceitful murder on himself, the bullet piercing his heart. So close was the weapon held to the breast of the murderer-suicide that his clothing was ignited and partially burned. The crime was committed during a temporary fit of insanity. Young Simpson had been ill for some time, and it is supposed that his mind became affected.

Police Force an Entrance.

From time to time watchers around the house could see the murderer peering through the drawn blinds. At one time he shot and killed a passing dog. Constables arrived about four o'clock, and, after reconnoitering for a few moments, determined to force the rear entrance. A fusillade was made on the front of the house, while, with revolvers drawn, the police fired over the rear door. They had not gone far before they found that the murderer had taken his own life.

When it was seen that the last chapter of the tragedy was closed, a jury was empanelled, and, after viewing the remains an inquest was formally opened on the body of Mrs. Simpson.

To make pies in blankets, wrap large fresh oysters, each in a slice of bacon, using wooden footpicks to pin the blankets together. Serve on toast.

Labor Members Are Accused of Aping.

Glasgow, January 28. — About 400 delegates, representing 400,000 members of the Labor party, met in Glasgow last night in a special conference on the Parliamentary policy of the party. Complaint is made that the Labor members in Parliament have allowed themselves to be absorbed by the Government majority, thereby denying the members representation.

H. Quinn, a Manchester delegate, delivered a typical speech. "The leaders have left the orange boxes of the street corners to sit on the soft cushions of Parliament," he said. "There is too much 'doing the grand' about them. They neglect their work in order to ape the Dukes."

Will Not Claim

ESTATE OF STRATHCONA.

New York, Jan. 24.—James H. Smith, of Brookline, Mass., said here to-day that he was not a son of Lord Strathcona, the late High Commissioner of Canada, that he was only a step-son and that he had not claimed any interest in his stepfather's estate. Despatches from Boston last night reported that Mr. Smith would not seek to obtain recognition as Lord Strathcona's son and legal heir. Mr. Smith said he was a son of Lady Strathcona by her former marriage. Lord Strathcona, he explained, was married to Lady Strathcona in 1882 at North West Bay, Hamilton Inlet, in the province of Labrador, with the jurisdiction of Newfoundland. Lord Strathcona did not arrive at North West Bay until the autumn of 1882, and previous to that had lived in another part of Newfoundland. Mr. Smith was born in June, 1882.

Farmer Convict Kills Widow And Himself.

San Francisco, January 28.—James E. Glennard, a former convict, shot and killed Mrs. Cleo Ferrand, a widow here last night and then turned the pistol on himself, dying instantly. The woman had refused to marry him.

Five months ago Glennard was released from the Federal prison at Atlanta, Ga., where he served a term for counterfeiting. He had been arrested in New York where he met Mrs. Ferrand.

After his release from prison Glennard learned that Mrs. Ferrand had come to San Francisco and he followed.
