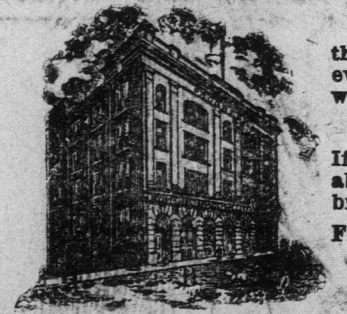

## Stefansson Rescued by "Polar Bear."

Special to Evening Telegram.  
VICTORIA, B.C., Sept. 17.  
Stefansson is safe on Banks Land.  
He was rescued by the schooner Polar Bear.

E. F. CHAFE, who sends the message was one of the crew of the ill-fated Karluk, which Capt. Bob Bartlett commanded. He has been in the hospital at Victoria some nine months, ever since he landed there, with a frost bitten heel which necessitated the amputation of part of his foot. He is a son of Mr. Fred G. Chafe of St. John's, and is a brother-in-law of Mr. Alair Shaw, of the Evening Telegram Office.

OTTAWA, Sept. 17.  
Stefansson is safe. The Naval Department received the following message this morning: Baillie Island, August 31, via Nome, Alaska, Sept. 16. As unavoidable delays threatened, and running the cost of chartering the Polar Bear is high, I purchased her and engaged her on terms similar to the Karluk. I have engaged Hoff, Engineer of Schurby, to place Blue of Alaska; have engaged five extra helpers for Southern parts who have ample outfit for one year, and Polar Bear's for two years. Plan to continue Northern Exploration to hundred and forty-five west and eighty-two farther north if northerly course is secured.

Nome, Alaska, Sept. 18.—Vilhjalmur Stefansson, the Canadian explorer, believed lost in the Arctic, is not only alive and well, but has discovered new land in the north, and accomplished every purpose for which his hazardous journey was undertaken, according to word brought here by the power schooner Ruby, which arrived yesterday from Herschel Island. Stefansson, with two companions, stoker Stokerson and Ole Andersen set out from Martin Point, Alaska, on March 22, 1914, over the frozen polar ocean, to search for supposed new lands in Beaufort Sea. Capt. Cottle, master of the Ruby, says that Stefansson is now on Banks Land, east of Mackenzie, outfitting for a continuance of his explorations westward to ascertain the full extent of that new land he has discovered, southwest of Prince Patrick Island. Stefansson discovered the continuance of a continental shelf several days west of Banks Land, and even determined its southern limits, but was unable to continue his explorations to the northwest. Stefansson told Capt. Cottle that after leaving his supporting party on the ice north of Martin Point, he and his hardy companions set their faces north, but after continuing their journey ninety days, they decided to come back. They turned about and landed on a mainland point near which the power boat Mary Sacks, of the Stefansson expedition was wintering. Here the three men outfitting for another three months' trip. They again went up on the ice, going northwest, and discovering the continental shelf.
