## The Real Woodrow Wilson.

(By Isaac F. Marcossion.)

I first met Woodrow Wilson in 1911, when he was Governor of New Jersey.

With the almost precipitate evidence which accompanied his election to the presidency he had been projected from the academic quiet of a college presidency into the fierce light that beats about national politics. He was a Presidential possibility.

If your Kings were elected by popular vote you would find the parallel in an active Governor of Kent (assuming that there was such an office) being almost unexpectedly considered as a candidate for the national rulership.

This swift projection into the arena of national life, however was not as sudden as appeared on the surface. The explanation furnishes the first intimate index to the character of the President who has faced the most difficult and solemn problems encountered by an American Executive since Lincoln's day. When Wilson was a struggling lawyer in one of our Southern States he saw the vision of a national career rounded out with the goal that is the dream of every American school boy—the Presidency.

Then began a definite campaign of preparation—slow, sometimes, stolid, but always persistent. Those who know Woodrow Wilson best—and they are not many—know that he has always felt himself to be more or less a Man of Political Destiny. Now comes the first and only kinship with Theodore Roosevelt, who almost from birth has believed himself to be an Inspired Nation Mentor. Each of these men realised his dream by different processes that are astonishingly typical of their temperament.

Roosevelt was inevitable. Exiled into the political eclipse which masks under the office of Vice-President, he was raised to the Presidency by the tragic death of William McKinley. But, regardless of circumstances, he would have risen. It is as impossible to suppress him as it is to curb Niagara. He had become what the United States called Grant—a Man on Horseback—which means that he had been literally dashed into politics on the red wave of war. The exploits of the Rough Riders in the Cuban War made Roosevelt Governor of New York, which is one traditional approach to the White House. With Wilson, on the other hand, there was none of the glamour of spectacular heroism, no tumult or shouting. His elevation to the highest office in the gift of the people was the final act of a silent drama of patient preparation. It explains, perhaps, what seemed to be his interminable forbearance of German insult and aggression. His Job-like attitude which rasped so many of his countrymen bespoke no lack of patriotism. It was merely Wilson the Man pursuing, as Wilson the President, the un-hurried tenor of his way to reach in time the moment of action.

### The Man and His Methods.

Let me illustrate. When I first met the President I had been "assigned" to write a magazine interview with him. It was an important moment in

### THE GARAGE BILL.

The garage bill is a successful method of discouraging people from buying four automobiles at once.

When a man buys a sparkling new automobile which in the hands of a selfish demonstrator can climb a 45 per cent. grade on its hind legs, he does not realize that it is like the flower that fades and the grass that withereth. He does not discover at first, either, that it contains 72 grease cups and 475 oil holes which should be charged every Sunday morning between the hours of 6.30 a.m. and 12 m.

If any one of these oil holes is overlooked, it will cause some sensitized spot to rust out or chip off or break loose, and the more sensitive it is the more it costs to get a duplicate copy.

When an automobile breaks down in some remote center, it is sent to the garage, where expert workmen can take it all apart and hold a post-mortem examination. Every once in a while the trouble can be located without taking out the engine, but it is much more satisfactory to tear down everything but the honeycomb tubing in the radiator. Several large dry goods boxes are then filled with nuts, bolts, screws, hub caps and other debris, and are never missed by the owner until he is out on the road. Many a distressing case of magneto trouble has been located at once by removing the rear axle and tracing up the hind wheels.

It is a great shock to a trusting tourist to take a smoothly running automobile into a garage to be looked over and come back to the next morning to find that it has been broken up into some fifty miles farther without committing murder on the owner. It is then discovered that several vital parts have been worn out, owing to the European war, and a list of needed supplies is made out on a sheet of paper with a wheelbase of 128 inches. When a man looks at this list with tear-bedimmed eyes he will wish he had been born in the stone age instead of the horseless age.

This leads me to one of his greatest gifts—an oratory strangely effective when you consider his academic structure. It mixes the God-given fervour of Lloyd George's eloquence; has none of the impassioned fire that Roosevelt puts into his speeches. But it has a finished, polished, and well-nigh perfect expression of word and delivery that never fails to hold attention. He talks precisely as he writes—brilliantly. Save only Roosevelt, no living American approaches him as phrase-maker.

One curious fact about Wilson's method is that he writes all his important work on a small typewriter himself. He knows shorthand, and his plan is to jot down the speech, message or letter in a notebook in the form of short hand notes and then transcribe them. His famous Note to Germany after the torpedoing of the Lusitania was done in this way.

Woodrow Wilson has more than a community of grave war responsibility with Abraham Lincoln. Like the Great Emancipator, he prefers to point his moral or drive home his argument with a story.

One of his favourites is of a doughy sea captain who had to deal with a noisy and mutinous crew. He got them together on the deck one day and in language more forceful than elegant laid down the law. Then he added with vehemence: "All I want of you men is silence, and not much of that."

Analyze Wilson's speeches and letters and you will find a Lincoln-like

simplicity and directness of style, and with it, in many instances, the same kind of homely application of truths. His historic speech to Congress in which he defied Germany may well claim kinship with some of Lincoln's noblest utterances, and more especially the Second Inaugural Speech.

I am one of many Americans who have differed with President Wilson in policy and politics, who felt, after the official inertia which followed the sinking of the Lusitania, that his Americanism had become diluted. But eventually he has found the way to the truth and to the light. Having declared the faith, he will abide by the great decision. It is the Wilson way. His Americanism, now the Americanism of an aroused and united people, is henceforth part of that larger world-creed of organized protest against authorized brutality.

## A Wonderful Timepiece

With a view to providing the exact time for chronometers used on American warships, the Navy Department has a master clock in a vault under the Naval Observatory, where the temperature is never allowed to vary more than the hundredth part of one degree.

This evenness of temperature is ensured by means of a thermostat and a small electric stove. When the temperature rises the thermostat automatically turns off the stove, and when it falls below normal the stove starts working again. Sometimes the electric bulb is switched off and on again over a dozen times a minute.

Before being dispatched from the Observatory all chronometers are kept under close scrutiny in a room hung around with wet clothes. This is done so as to accustom them as far as possible to the conditions of moisture which prevail at sea.—Tit Bits.
