S. S. Ranger in Port

LAST OF SHIPS TO ARRIVE FROM NORTHERN SEALFISHERY.

S.S. Ranger, Capt. Wesley Kean, arrived yesterday at 6.30 p.m., bringing home the key to the northern seal-fishery. The Ranger, built for 18,000 old and young seals, but judging by the heavily laden appearance of the ship when entering port, her turn-out will probably exceed this estimate. The Ranger was the last of the ships to proceed north, having battled with the ice barricade on the outside for four days before getting into open water. Capt. Kean then took a course for the eastward and, working in due west from Fogo Island, struck a small patch of seals on St. Patrick's Day, off Cape John, in which 3,500 were killed and penned. Whilst the crew were engaged in taking them on board, the ship was driven into Green Bay with the seals, and became jammed up in closely packed ice. For two weeks the ship remained in this position, and it was not until the end of March that she got free again. Word was then received that a patch of seals lay in White Bay. Captain Kean steered direct for Hr. Deep and on the 2nd of April, in company with the Thetis, a fairly good patch was struck, of which 12,000 were accounted for. The crew were busily engaged hauling the seals on board, all of which had to be brought over the rough ice, a distance of from three to seven miles. On April 17th, with 16,000 stowed, the Ranger was worked out of White Bay, after which fair progress was made in the vicinity of the Funks, where the hunt for the bedlamers began. Over 2,000 of these were killed in the heavy rafted ice on the following day and hauled on board. Weather conditions getting worse, Capt. Kean decided to abandon the voyage and with a snug load stowed down below decks, the greatest of care had to be exercised in bringing the ship along. Easterly winds and heavy seas forced the ship into Seal Cove, where she remained for several days. The next port was Valleyfield, and on Tuesday night last, the ship was forced to put into Pool's Island, B.B., leaving the latter port early yesterday morning. She made a good run down the coast, passing Catalina at 11 a.m., and arrived in port in the time already started. Capt. Kean and crew are in the best of health and feel quite satisfied with the results attained under such unprecedented ice conditions as were encountered during the spring. The Ranger commenced discharging this morning.

- (c) That the Plan accompanying same is a correct plotting of the notes of the said survey.

Anglican Cathedral Parishioners Meet

The annual meeting of the Parishioners of the Church of England Cathedral Parish, took place in the Parish Room, Synod Hall, last night, at 8 o'clock. The Rev. Canon Jones, president, and the attendance of ladies and gentlemen was a record. Mr. Leonard Outerbridge read the minutes and the Rector read the rules of the Synod in respect to the annual meeting. The account for the year was presented by Mr. Leonard Outerbridge in the absence of Hon. John Davey, People's Warden. The accounts were received and referred to a special committee for future consideration. The election of the People's Warden resulted in the Parish unanimously electing Mr. Frank E. Rendell. Rev. Canon Jones announced the re-appointment of Mr. E. C. Outerbridge as Rector's Warden during the ensuing year. The Finance Committee made its report through the Hon. Secretary-Treasurer, Mr. E. D. Bate. The new Committee elected as follows:—C. B. Dicks, Hon. Chairman; E. D. Bate, Hon. Secretary-Treasurer; and the following: Messrs. Crocker, Best, Hiscock, Gill, Feaver, Shears, Moore, Lilly, Pope, Jacob Bishop, White and H. S. Hayward. The representatives of the Cemetery Board made their annual report through Mr. S. G. Collier, and the following gentlemen were appointed to represent the Parish on the Board: Messrs. S. G. Collier, C. A. Hubler, and James Chaffey. The following were elected members of the General Protestant Industrial Board: Messrs. Jacob Bishop, Thomas Peel, and the Hon. John Davey. The Parish representatives of the Synod to the Synod were elected in the persons of Sir Wm. Horwood, and Mr. F. E. Rendell. The Auditors, Messrs. W. J. Martin and Thomas Collingwood. The sidesmen or ushers were elected as follows:—Messrs. J. H. Williams, W. Butler, A. Feaver, R. Learning, E. Ewing, W. Oakley, H. Gabriel, T. Humphries, H. Adams, H. Pope, Geo. Morris, W. Snow, H. Grant, W. Barrett, B. Dicks, E. Best, W. Gardner, D. Shears, H. Parsons, S. Gill, S. White, G. Crossman, and J. Chaffey. Votes of thanks were passed to the choir and other church officials. The meeting was most successful. Unfortunately the accounts show that the parish has a small deficit which the Church Warden is making arrangements to liquidate as promptly as possible. The following members of the Select Vestry were elected by ballot and were announced at the close of the meeting. They are as follows:—Sir Joseph Outerbridge, Sir William Horwood, S. G. Collier, C. Mc K. Harvey.

Scorching Viscount

LORD CURZON'S MOTORING LICENCE SUSPENDED.

Already convicted 21 times for motoring offences, Viscount Curzon was summoned at Acton for driving at excessive speed in Chiswick High-road—Police evidence was that the speed of the car was 32 miles an hour. When told he would be summoned the viscount inquired: "Are you timing?"—Mr. Bryant, who represented defendant, asked the police if they noticed the vehicle had four-wheeled brakes, but they had not observed it. Mr. Bryant did not dispute the speed, but explained that the brakes enabled the car to be pulled up very quickly and made for safety. Defendant would have been present but for his parliamentary duties.—Viscount Curzon was fined 20s and his licence was suspended for six months. The chairman observed that small fines appeared to be useless and another course had to be followed. In view of an appeal against the decision he fixed sittings.
