Forty-Five Years in the Service of
the Public—The Evening Telegram.

In the Realms of Sport

CL.B.C. SPORTS A BIG SUCCESS. Gower Stone Wins 10 Mile Road Race.

The CL.B. Cadet Sports, held under the auspices of the CL.B. Athletic Association, took place on St. George's Field yesterday afternoon, and were attended by upwards of 2,000 people. The sports were attended by Lieut.-Col. Rendell and officers of the Brigade, Hon. Tasker Cook and Mrs. Cook, besides several of the clergy and many prominent citizens. The committee in charge carried out the programme in a very capable manner. The different events proved most interesting, being very keenly contested and great interest was shown by all present in the various contests. The pyramid exhibition by a squad from the CL.B. under Physical Instructor Sergt. Keats, was splendidly executed and proved a feature of the sports. Some records were upset in the running broad jump, Sam Parsons (M.G.C.A.) took the honors from T.V. Payne, A.A.A. winner in 1923. He bettered the previous winner's jump of 15ft. 9in. by 5 inches, with H. Diamond (M.G.C.A.), who came second, beat the former record by 2 inches. Grant Burnell (CL.B.), in the 2 mile walk hung up a new record for this event. Burnell covered the course yesterday in 16 min. 39 1/2 sec., beating his own time of 16 min. 56 1/2 sec. at the same sports last year. Hearty congratulations to the victors on their new records. Jim Herder (M.G.C.A.), retained his former honors. He carried off the prize in the hurdles, 100, 220, and 440 yards dashes. His performance in the above events were features of the sports, and the capturing of four events in one single afternoon can be constituted as a record in local athletic circles. The one and half mile events were closely contested and proved very interesting. Skirving (CL.B.) the local champion, found in C. Stone (CL.B.) and Gordon Perry (M.G.C.A.), hard nuts to crack, and the appearance of these three runners in future races will be looked forward to with ever increasing interest. Skirving is ably upholding his previous honors. The Club competition for the special trophy was closely contested for between the CL.B. and M.G.C.A. track teams. The M.G.C.A. scored the largest number of points (44) and were awarded the trophy. The CL.B. came a close second with 40 points. The Saints emerged victorious over the Star in the final football sixes. During the ten minutes play no scoring resulted, but in the overtime period the Saints scored one goal and two corners to their opponent's nil. The winning players were—Calvert, Elton, Burridge, Young, Roberts and Sawyers. During the progress of the game Elton suffered a broken rib and was later attended by a doctor.

Ten Mile Road Race.

Only four entries lined up for the ten mile road race, viz: Stone, Ralph, Russell and Willar. To Davey's the first three were neck and neck, but at this point Russell dropped behind, having taken a cramp. The other two continued on and at the Sanitorium were still together, but at this point Stone began to get away from his opponent and finished just two laps in front of Ralph, who was about a lap and a half ahead of Russell. Willar did not finish. For his first time in a 10 mile road race Stone did well, and made good time. The prizes have not yet arrived, and the official presentation of same will take place in the CL.B. Armory at a very early date. During the afternoon, the Brigade Band, under Capt. A. Morris, was present, and gave pleasing selections between the various events. The committee in charge is to be complimented on the splendid success of the sports. JUNIOR LEAGUE FOOTBALL. Holy Cross The Victors.

At St. George's Field last night the Holy Cross and T.A. teams, of the Junior League, played to a fair attendance of spectators. The game, which was a very good one, ended in a victory for Holy Cross, last year's champions, by a score of 2 goals to nil. In the first half the game was evenly divided, but about ten minutes before time Neville notched the first goal although he brought it in with his hands. However, the referee was behind and could not see it. The second half was not long in progress when the Holy Cross' again scored from a scrimmage in front of goal, and about five minutes before full time Neville was responsible for the third goal.

Features of the game were the excellent team work of the Holy Cross who played a game that showed thorough training, and the excellent work of the T.A. goalkeeper, Marshall. This was his first game on St. George's Field and he showed up well, but the superior weight of the Holy Cross backs always broke any attacks that were made by their opponents forward line. Mr. R. Walsh was referee and performed his duties to the satisfaction of all.

Contestants are now getting in the final stage of training for all events and it is quite likely a few records may be shattered.

There are some splendid prizes for various events. The winning football sixes will contend for Governor Harris's cup. A cup has also been presented by Hon. J. P. Hand, Bermuda, for the International Relay Race, and a massive silver cup awaits the victorious tug-of-war championship.
