Mr. Elliott thought it was quite competent for the Council to consider the application. If it were referred to the Road and Bridge Committee they would imply report "no funds." This applieation had been made because the ap eation had been made because the appropriation already made to the ward was not sufficient for the large territory to which it had to be applied, which extended west from Wyndham and Woolwich street towards the boundaries of the town. He referred in detail to the large amount of work which was imperatively required in the Ward, and the inconvenience suffered by the residents for the want of it. The West Ward had more Ward streets than any in the town, and the Road and Bridge Committee, in assuming the care of the streets, had left the West Ward some of the worst portions of some of them, as for instance, on Cork street and Dublin street.
