MANY VESSELS ASHORE.

HALIFAX, Dec. 3.—Every hour brings fresh reports of wrecks caused by Monday's storm, which seems to have been most destructive on the Cape Breton coast. The schooners Bella May and Saxon are ashore at Gabarus. The Isabella parted her chains at Arichat and was driven ashore. The Native Lass is ashore at Glasgow harbor, Canso, and the Maggie Millard is ashore and full of water at Gabarus. The foregoing are all from Halifax, bound to Cape Breton ports. The schocner Virgesco is also reported ashore at Lower Descousse, C. B. All these vessels are insured more or less in Halifax offices and agencies, which suffer severely from the effects of the storm.
