EAST MIDDLESEX. Enthusiastic Meeting at Nilestown in the Interest of the Reform Candidate, Mr. T. H. Purdom.

NILESTOWN, May 2.—A large and enthusiastic meeting was held last night in the public hall at Nilestown in the interests of Reform. Mr. Alex. Leith was chosen chairman, and in a few words introduced Mr. Geo. C. Davis, who delivered a good speech, dealing mainly with the separate school question.

He was followed by Mr. A. D. Hardy, whose pointed and well-delivered address won the good opinion of his audience. Mr. Hardy though a young man has developed into a good platform speaker. He dealt with the general policy of the Government and contrasted the management of the Crown lands in the Dominion with the policy pursued in Ontario in a telling way, and closed with a strong appeal to the electors to be true to the country's best interests and elect a supporter of the Mowat Administration.

Mr. D. H. Tennent followed with a neat, short speech, taking up the question of Provincial rights and claiming the support of the electors for the Mowat Administration on that ground.

Mr. T. H. Purdom, the Reform candidate, then addressed the meeting at some length, taking up the ballot system of Ontario. He pointed out how the advantages of the Ontario system caused it to be adopted. The statement that it was not a secret system had no weight, because before it failed to be secret someone must commit perjury. Nousch case had occurred since it was adopted. The benefit of the system was that it prevented fraud, ballot-stuffing and bribery to a large extent, while other systems—notably the American—opened the door wide to all these. He then contrasted the license system of the Government with the policy of the Opposition, after which he dealt with the French cry and the Roman Catholic cry, claiming that it was but a repetition of the old cry of 1880, and he thought contrary to the real inclination of the leader of the Opposition. He had been for want of a better cry compelled again to adopt these old order, if possible, to gain votes through the Jesuit agitation, with which the Mowat Government had nothing to do.

Mr. Purdom was frequently applauded throughout his address, and at its close Mr. Leith, the chairman, as an old Reformer who had voted over 50 years, said they expected every man to do his duty. The well-pleased meeting closed with cheers for the Queen, the Hon. O. Mowat and the Reform candidate.
