mercial Agency. TORONTO, Oct. 4 .- R. G. Dun & Co.'s weekly report of trade in Canada says: There is little change in the financial situation this week. General trade has not resumed the buoyancy that had been anticipated. There is no particular activity in the industries that stimulate the demand

for money. Travelers of leading Toronto houses report a continuance of the satisfactory trade

improvement. The movement in barley is yet restricted and flour are lower. General produce is plentiful and lower, including apples, logs, potatoes and other vegetables.

Prime commercial paper is discounted at 6 to 61 per cent, while call loans on choice collateral are quoted at 4 to 43 per cent. The number of failures for the week ended Oct. 3 was 29, as compared with 44 in the corresponding week of last year.

THE latest thing in the chicken business is the electric incubator, which is now very nearly perfected. The capacity of such a machine is practically unlimited, and the experiments have shown that electricity is very much better adapted to hatching purposes than steam or hot air. The percentage claimed for it is far greater than has ever been accomplished before, and the chicks come into the world in much healthier condition. The electric incubator has evidently come to stay.

That was an improper thing to do, and I hope that all magistrates will take into consideration what I am now saying. It is a most extraordinary proceeding. The paper became a public document, but should have been held in custody. It was not for Collier to say that the warrant should be issued only at his instance. If the magistrate was satisfied with the information it was his duty not to wait for the prosecutor,

but issue the warrant and have it executed. But he gave up the information, and in my judgment it become from then a piece of waste paper. We find that this information is kept in the possession of the presecutor-I cannot say for what purpose, but it is suggested that Collier held it in order to induce Kilbourne to marry his daughter. The offense was committed in April, 1893, but although the information was laid in November of last year it was not acted upon until July, 1894. Both magistrates did an improper thing. In the first place I think Mr. Lacey was wrong in issuing that warrant. The case from beginning to end is full of extraordinary circumstances.
