she was 5 years old, her father removed to Harris street, West Oxford where she resided until her marriage with Mr. Roberts, Oct. 10, 1848, who at that time was a house painter in Ingersoll. Afterwards they removed to Mount Elgin, Dereham, where they resided for ten years. At the expiration of that time Mr. Roberts was obliged to give up his trade through ill-health, and moved to his wife's old homestead on Harris street, where they resided for thirteen years. Then they went to Ingersoll again, where they remained until about two years ago, when they came on a visit to Strathroy. Here she was taken very ill and pronounced by the doctor too delicate to ever keep house again. Since then the old couple have spent their time between Strathroy and Sarnia with thir daughters. Mrs. Roberts' last illness was of a paralytic nature and lasted about three or four days. For 35 yars deceased was a consistent and esteemed member of the Methodist Church, and her quiet effective work was much appreciated in her own church at Salford.
