

Aberdeen Coming

Will Be in London September 16, 17 and 18.

Proceedings of the City Council Last Night.

Immoderate Bicycle Riding to Be Stopped.

Wheelmen in the Same List as Horse-Mis Haynes Claims Damages—Charitable Grants—A Mare's Nest—Cold Storage Agreement—The Sewage Bylaw.

The colored citizens' grand fancy dress ball, and the regular meeting of the City Council, having both been scheduled for next Monday evening at the City Hall, the aldermen gracefully gave way and had their assembly last night. They decided to give their colored brethren full swing on Monday, and so the city fathers disposed of their affairs in advance. They are now free to attend the ball. It is several weeks since the council met, and quite a heap of civic business had accumulated.

LORD ABERDEEN COMING.
The mayor reported that he had received word from the Governor-General's secretary that Lord Aberdeen would be here on Sept. 16, 17 and 18, and would be pleased to meet the members of the council.

Ald. McCallum—Ald. Nutkins says it is hardly fair to those who haven't plug hats.

The communication was referred to No. 1 committee to arrange for the earl's reception in a manner worthy of this great metropolis and its city fathers.

WANT A STORE INSPECTOR.
A communication from Frank Plant, president of the Trades and Labor Council, inclosed a numerous signed petition asking that an inspector be appointed for business places, apart from factories, as required by statute. It was referred to No. 3 committee.

LICENSING BICYCLE LIVERYES.
A communication from the city solicitor, stating that the council had no power to impose a license fee on dealers renting bicycles, stirred up Ald. Dreaney. He did not think it fair to tax livery stable keepers, and let bicycle dealers, who rented wheels in competition, go free. Bicycle liveryes were licensed in other cities.

Ald. O'Meara supported Ald. Dreaney. He saw no difference between hiring horses and hiring wheels.

Ald. Bennett said the city had better get another solicitor if he did not know the law. Ald. Parnell's motion to ascertain the regulations in other cities was adopted.

WANT DAMAGES.
Messrs. Meredith, Cameron, Judd & Dromsore wrote claiming damages on behalf of Miss Annie Hayes, who was injured in a collision with the patrol wagon some time ago. No. 1 committee will consider it.

THOSE WATERING CARTS.
Ald. Pritchard has discovered a mare's nest. Two watering carts disappeared some time ago, and turned up in a dismantled condition at No. 1 fire hall. He suspected some idler's sleight-of-hand work. The engineer reported that the gearing of these carts had been used in the construction of new carts.

Ald. Pritchard was not satisfied with this report, and hinted that some parts of these carts were used for other purposes. Ald. Taylor moved that the engineer be empowered to find out where the carts were taken to No. 1 fire hall and who ordered it to be done. This was voted down and the report was filed. Ald. Parnell said the old carts had constantly to be repaired and were unsatisfactory.

PUTTING BRAKES ON WHEELMEN.

Ald. John Heaman's report from No. 2 committee was thorough without a murmur. The purchase of several new fire alarm boxes was the chief recommendation.

Ald. Parnell presented the report of the Board of Works.

The first clause aimed to put bicyclists under the same regulations as those driving horses or other animals. It forbade wheelmen riding at an immoderate rate, and called upon them to slacken at crossings where people were passing.

Ald. Cooper, the wheelmen's champion, wanted to know what they called an immoderate rate for a bicycle. A wheelman might better walk than be compelled to ride five miles an hour. He moved that the clause be struck out.

Ald. Taylor said he was nearly run over by a lady bicyclist the other day.

Ald. O'Meara—Well, I am surprised at an Irishman objecting to a young lady running against him. Why, when I was a young man I wouldn't have minded half a dozen running against me. (Laughter.)

Ald. Cooper accused the aldermen of trifling with the bicyclists.

The mayor and Ald. Bennett explained that the sole purpose of the clause was to prevent dangerous bicycle riding on the city streets, and that no immoderate rate of speed was laid down.

The clause finally passed. Ald. Cooper resolutely voting nay.

The clause referring to the construction of an asphalt pavement in the Market Lane was referred back to the committee to advertise the work.

The third clause, which was carried, recommended the passage of bylaws for the construction of a tile drain on Maitland street, south of South street; a tile drain on Wolfe street, between Wellington and Waterloo streets; and a macadam pavement on Dufferin avenue, between Wellington and Waterloo streets; and that the committee be empowered to have the improvements done by day labor, under the supervision of the engineer and the committee.

The committee was also empowered to accept these tenders for City Hall alterations: For electric wiring, etc., \$66; painting and glazing, \$228, and carpenter work, \$291—a total of \$585.

CHARITABLE GRANTS.

Ald. Armstrong presented the finance committee's report, the first clause of

which read: "Your committee begs to recommend that the Protestant Orphan's Home, Mount Hope Orphanage and Children's Aid Society be granted \$350, \$200 and \$150 respectively, for the year 1896, on a guarantee being given that no further claim will be made on the city for support and shelter of neglected children, and that the Women's Christian Association and Convalescent Home be granted \$200 and \$100, respectively."

In connection with this, Mr. T. R. Parker presented the claims of the Children's Aid Society to a larger grant, some \$500. He told of the good work done by the society in caring for destitute and neglected children, and providing homes for them. The corporation, he pointed out, could be called upon by law to pay \$1 per week for each child on the society's hands. The sum asked for would pay the charges already incurred by the society, and enable them to prosecute their work for some time.

Mr. Parker's petition was not granted, and the clause was carried, the committee having considered that the grant to the orphanages would answer the same purpose, as the society place their children in those homes temporarily, until permanent homes are found for the little ones.

The petition of the Salvation Army for grants towards the Workingmen's Hotel and the Refuge was rejected, although Ald. Wm. Heaman moved to give them \$50 each.

THE COLD STORAGE COMPANY.
The seventh clause directed the preparation of an agreement between the city and the Dominion Cold Storage Company, which will be considered later. The principal points are that the company will erect a building costing from \$10,000 to \$15,000, and will get exemption from the taxes for ten years, excepting school, local improvement and water rates. The company are evidently determined to locate in London, and the city fathers, the mayor, asking when the agreement will be ready.

INSURING FAIR BUILDINGS.
Another important clause in the committee's report instructed the engineer to get the valuation of the Fair buildings, so that insurance may be effected immediately. Tenders will be called for the insurance.

REPAIRING THE STREETS.
Ald. Taylor asked if it was the intention to repair the streets in the city of the city traversed by the street railway.

Ald. Parnell replied that the street railway company had started grading Wellington street, and would rush the work henceforth.

THE SMOKE NUISANCE.
Ald. Skinner moved a motion requiring manufacturers to provide apparatus for consuming smoke, so as to avoid the nuisance caused by smoke.

Ald. Bennett said the only way to avoid it would be to compel manufacturers to burn something that would not smoke. He would like to know if a city where factories did not smoke.

Ald. John Heaman said the electric company had an apparatus that prevented the nuisance.

The motion was lost.

FUN OVER THE LIGHTS.
Ald. Wm. Heaman moved for an electric light at the corner of South and Colborne streets.

Ald. Parnell said it cost the people from 80 to 85 cents per head for light.

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After the Holidays.

Many Changes Recommended by Inspector Carson.

Applications Received and Tenders for School Supplies Awarded.

Tenders for school supplies, teachers and changes in the staff were the topics discussed by No. 1 committee last night. Seated around the table were Trustees Griffin (chairman), Dr. Campbell, Sanders, Murphy, Greenlees, Stephenson, Bayly, Johnston, Dr. Teasdale, Inspector Carson, and Secretary McElheran.

The application of Mr. Lockhead for the position of science master in the Collegiate Institute received favorable consideration. It was accompanied by testimonials of a high order, and a letter of recommendation from Principal Merchant. On motion of Mr. Sanders it was decided to recommend the board to appoint him.

Other applications were recommended on motion of Mr. Sanders, among which were Miss Campbell, Miss Lee, Miss Jackson and Essy Martin, who seek appointment on the substitute staff.

Mr. Johnston moved to place Mr. N. V. Plewes at the head of Simcoe street school, Miss Roberson at Mr. Graham during the model school term, at the same salary that he received last year.

The inspector's report was submitted for adoption. It showed a careful study of the ability and usefulness of the whole staff, and will necessitate numerous changes. He recommended that:

Miss McArthur be transferred from Victoria school to the senior form in Wortley road school, and act as principal.

Miss Powell be transferred from Aberdeen school to Part II. of Wortley road.

Miss Munroe be appointed to the Junior third in Victoria school.

Miss Willmott be transferred from Part I. Colborne street, to Part II. Aberdeen.

Miss McNaughton be transferred from Part I. South Waterloo, to Part II. Colborne street school.

Miss Murch be appointed to the Senior Third, Rectory street.

Miss Hendrie be appointed to Part II. Rectory street.

Miss Evans be transferred from Part I. Park street, to Part II. St. George's.

Miss McEwen be transferred from transition at Talbot street and appointed to Part I. at St. George's.

Miss Callard be transferred from transition staff of Colborne street to Junior Third, Princess avenue, to Junior Second, Colborne street.

Miss Taylor and class be returned to Waterloo street school.

Miss Hardey be substituted for Miss Callard, Miss McEwen for Miss McEwen, and that Miss Riggby, until Christmas.

Miss Phillips be transferred from Aberdeen to transition staff of Colborne street school.

Miss Hicks be appointed director of Lorne avenue kindergarten.

Miss Matthews be transferred from Queen's Avenue afternoon school to Lorne avenue.

Miss Ethel Cannon be appointed to Queen's Avenue afternoon class as assistant.

Miss Ella Robertson be appointed to St. George's morning class as assistant.

There was considerable inquiry regarding the proposed changes. Dr. Carson assured them it could not be improved upon with advantage, and laid stress upon the abilities of Miss Hicks as a kindergarten teacher, in classing her as the best in the Dominion.

The report passed intact.

The New Premier.

Give Him a Fair Chance to Govern Canada Rightly.

Straightforward Plea for Justice to a Good Man.

From the Canada Presbyterian.

We hold no brief for Wilfrid Laurier, and as little for his party or Government. We have no axes to grind, no favors to ask, no political schemes of any kind to put through. But we think that there is a danger of the new Premier in some quarters getting less than fair play, and against this tendency most earnestly protest.

What means the outcry, not seldom heard, against a French-Canadian and Roman Catholic being Premier of this Dominion? At the bottom of it all there must surely be a more or less latent feeling either of contempt for his race or of suspicion for his religion; and either of both these would be as criminal and unworthy as anything well could be. In such circumstances what is the use of talking about "Equal Rights" or "practical" or "fair field and no favor?" Have we still such a thing in Canada as an "inferior" or "conquered race?" Is a man's blood to be a bar to his social and political progress? Is anyone's readiness to pronounce some religious shibboleth to be the test of his fitness as a political leader or among his fellows? We had thought that the days of such intolerant and unreasoning bigotry had long since passed at least in Canada. Especially we had tried to persuade ourselves that it had so passed as far as Protestants were concerned; not merely in theory, but in feeling and practice as well. It is evident that in this connection we have been mistaken, for here we have ultra-Protestants and ultra-Catholics alike girding at the same man and howling out against him substantially the same objections. The one set protesting that a great Protestant country like Canada ought not to have a Roman Catholic Premier, and the other is exclaiming with equal vehemence that Laurier is a "rationalistic Liberal," and as such ought not to have the support "of any true son of the Church."

Is this decent? Is it fair? Is it reasonable? Is it honorable? Or is it honest? We do not believe it is.

Mr. Laurier has been before the country for many years. "The fierce light which beats out upon a throne" has given him a share of its exposing power. With what result the country knows. There has not been even a whispered charge against his personal record, and surely his ability to lead and rule could be settled without any reference either to his religion or his race. We are all Canadians here, and we may which calls itself free, and which still, at least, pretends to believe in the Sermon on the Mount.

It is just as proper a thing that Canadians should have a French-

Canadian for Premier, or for the matter of that, even a naturalized Frenchman, as the first man of the hour should be Welsh, or Dutch, an English peasant, or a Scotch or Irish talker of Gaelic.
