Grant, principal of Queen's University, Kingston, and Mr. John Willis Baer, of Boston, secretary of the United Society of the Christian Endeavor. Aylmer is the birthplace of Rev. Dr. Clarke, founder of the movement, and is easy of access by electric car. The Canadian railways have arranged for single fare rates, and the convention is likely to be one of the most import-


