McDonald, and after two days' polling was defeated by the narrow majority of 17 votes. The surviving members of the family are Dr. George Philipgton Mrs. Josiah Plack. George Billington, Mrs. Josiah Blackburn (of London), Mrs. Pegley, Mrs. Allison (of Spokane, Wash.), Miss F. Billington (matron of the Mimico asylum). The remains were interred in Strathroy on Saturday afternoon with Masonic rites. The pall-bearers were G. B. Parrott and W. E. 
