The action of Ottawa College was strongly indorsed by the delegates, and a motion was unanimously adopted that Ottawa College's action should be supported by the Quebec representatives at the annual meeting of the Canadian Rugby Union.

## JEFFORDS KNOCKED OUT.

New York, Nov. 28.—The fist contest between Bob Armstrong, the colored heavy-weight boxer, of Chicago, and Jim Jeffords, of California, which was slated to go 25 rounds before the Hercules A. C. last night, ended rather abruptly in the third round. Both men went head foremost from a clinch over the ropes into a box in the second round, and in the third Jeffords took another header from the effects of a right swing on the jaw. This took all the steam out of the big fellow, and when he regained his feet he was sent sprawling from a right uppercut in the vicinity of the belt. Jeffords rolled over in agony, and his seconds claimed a foul on the ground that he was hit below the belt. Referee Eckhardt decided that the blow landed fairly, and gave his verdict in favor of Armstrong, after Jeffords had been counted out and carried to his corner.

## VILLE MARIE BANK TROUBLE

President Weir Convicted of Making a False Statement.

Arrest in Connection With the Bowmanville Bank Robbery.

Montreal, Nov. 27.—William Weir, president of the defunct Ville Marie Bank, was found guilty in the court of Quebec of having made a false statement of the bank's affairs to the government in the month of June last, a short time previous to the bank's suspension. The jury took only a few minutes. Their verdict was coupled with a recommendation to mercy. Sentence was reserved. Defense will seek a new trial.

## MILLER STILL AT LARGE.

New York, Nov. 28.—The police officials here have yet found no trace of Wm. F. Miller. Letters poured in on Deputy Chief MacKellar today from all parts of the country, written by persons who said that they had been deceived by this man. Miller had been sent out by Miller and his employees. Some of the writers, in their letters, stated that they had deposited from \$200 to \$500. Other syndicates, connected with the operation of the Franklin syndicate, are being investigated.

## THE BOWMANVILLE BANK ROBBERY.

Bowmanville, Ont., Nov. 28.—One of the men who has served a term of six months in the jail at Hull, and who was suspected of being the man who robbed a bank in this town on the night of May 13 last, was arrested on Friday at Hull, and brought here, charged with assaulting and robbing Henry Metcalfe, the night watchman at that place. He gives his name as John Murray, and claims the United States as his home. He was brought before the police magistrate here today and was committed to jail at 10 o'clock. Metcalfe was very positive that Murray was the man who led the assault on that night, and gave the command to bind him. Murray refused to ask Metcalfe any questions or to say anything against the charge.
