DRINK DID IT.

and Suicide of a Grand Rapids News-
paper Man.

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., Jan. 1.—One of

the saddest suicides known in this city for

many years occurred Friday night. When

two compositors on the daily Eagle entered

the office Saturday morning they found the

telegraph editor, Will R. Maze, there be-
fore them. He was sitting at his desk, ap-
parently at work, and they did not ap-
proach him. A few minutes later one ofthe men chimed to pass through the room
again, and when Maze did not respond to
his salutation it was found that he was
dead. Before him on his desk lay his
pen, but "30" had been called and the
editor's face was as cold as marble.Will Maze was about 35 years old and
was considered exceptionally bright and
capable. He at one time had most excel-
lent prospects, but he contracted the un-
fortunate habit which eventually ruined
him. He was born in this city and worked
his way up from devil, through the com-
posing rooms into the editorial department.His father, who died a few years ago, was
at one time editor of the Evening Leader,
upon which paper the young man was also
once employed. A few years ago he went
to Minneapolis, Minn., where he prospered
as the editor of the Bismarck Tribune and
was elected probate judge. His intemper-
ate habits compelled him to resign, how-
ever, and he returned to this city. He
was among the first to take the gold cure,
but he was not cured, and with a desper-
ate resolution to conquer himself he
tried the gold cure a second time. The
demon could not be subdued, however,
and he returned to his cups with an in-
creased appetite.After a protracted spree his employers
notified him that they could not keep him
longer. Friday evening he received a note
from Managing Editor Theodore Carpenter
to that effect, and he at once began acting
strangely. He told one of his associates
that he had no desire to live any longer,
but as he had often threatened suicide little
attention was paid to him.A little bottle of morphine upon his desk
and an accompanying note showed the
route he had chosen. The note read as
follows:

"To Mr. Theodore Carpenter:

"I have read the notice which you left in
my room. I don't know whether a man
ever really died from heartbreak or not,
