LIBERTY IN LACED BOOTS.

Proposition to Modernize the Goddess of Liberty.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23.—Mr. Butler, of Iowa, has introduced in the House (by request) a bill to establish a truer figure of American constitutional liberty, and another to amend the great seal of the United States.

The first provides that after July 4 next the Goddess of Liberty shall be represented by a young woman of full stature, with mature development and proportions, wearing high laced boots, reaching midway between the ankle and knee; hose reaching to the thigh; short skirts, reaching downward to a point just above the elbow; and a cap molded from a blue pany bud. She is to bear for arms, at her left hip, in place of a staff, and lightly supported over her right shoulder a penholder extended, and on her breast, instead of a shield, an American ballot in black and white. The other measure amends the law establishing the seal so as to provide, instead of the present crest, which appears above the head of the eagle, a glory, breaking through a cloud pany, surrounding thirteen stars, forming a constellation argent and on an azure field.

Frog Skin Grafted on a Woman.

NEWBURYPORT, Feb. 23.—Mrs. J. Gilman Adams, who was badly burned at a tenement house fire a few weeks ago, has since been at the Anna Jacques Hospital. On Friday skin grafting was tried. The wound was so large that it was impossible to obtain human skin enough for the purpose, so frogs were used, and from them the skin was taken and grafted on the hand. Nearly 300 grafts were put on. The frogs were chloroformed before the skin was taken from them. The operation was performed by Dr. Frederick Tigh, who feels much gratified at the prospect of a full recovery.

CURLING.

Four rinks from the Royal City Club, of Guelph, arrived at Brantford on Wednesday to meet Brantford curlers in a friendly tussle for possession of the Robertson-McDonald trophy. Score—Royal City, 77; Brantford, 72.

A friendly curling match was played at Port Elgin on Wednesday between a picked rink of Grits and Tories, resulting in a victory for the Grits by seven shots.

The St. Catharines Curling Club visited Thorold on Wednesday afternoon, and played a friendly game with the Lornes of that place. Score—Lornes, 36; St. Catharines, 31.

HOCKEY.

STRAITFORD, Feb. 23.—A very exciting game of hockey was played here last evening between the Stratford and Varsity clubs, resulting in favor of the home team by a score of 7 to 6.

HAMILTON, Feb. 23.—The Winnipeg Hockey Club were to have played the Thistle Hockey Club here this evening, but at the last moment the Winnipegpe notified the local team that their "star player" refused to play and therefore the game must be canceled.

THE TURF.

MONROE BRINGS \$13,000.

NEW YORK, Feb. 22.—At Tattersall's today the stallion Monro was sold to Col. D. Walton, of this city, for \$13,000.

TURF TIPS.

It is said that W. O. B. Macdonough, who paid \$150,000 for Ormonde, has invested \$750,000 in horses during the past six months.

Baron Hirsch's eight race horses won 22 races worth \$160,000 on the English turf during 1892, making the average value of each race over \$7,500.

The newest thing in sulkeys is a jointed shaft, 46-pound affair, built for Robert Bonner. The jointed shaft is expected to do away with all horse motion.

SKATING.

MEAFORD, Feb. 23.—A five-mile skating race came off last evening on the Lorne ice rink for a purse of \$55 in gold. There were five entries. John Graham, of Toronto, won easily. James Woolner, of Collingwood, took second money, and I. McLeod, of Collingwood, third. About 500 people witnessed the race. Time, 17:20.

ATHLETICS.

The "Iron man" of Australia, Jim Borge, the "Iron man" of St. Paul, writer weights, fought at the Palo Club, San Francisco, on Tuesday night. The fight resulted in a draw in the 38th round.

The report that the chief of the Ontario police, who had received order out of Canada the Mitchell Corbett party when they came on Saturday to sign articles for the big fight is denied.

The Buchanan-Griffin fight in Turn Hall, Buffalo, on Tuesday night, wound up in a very sensational manner. After two rounds of fierce rushing on Griffin's part and evasion work by Buchanan, the former put sudden termination to the contest by butting his opponent on the side of the head and knocking him out. Both men were injured by the concussion. Referee Denny Ryan gave the fight to the inseparable man, Buchanan.

HE SHOULD HAVE BEEN SHUT OUT. He (Mitchell, the English prizefighter) comes to this country expressly to take part in unlawful combats, and his presence will undoubtedly do more to foster lawlessness and to lower the tone of public morals than would the landing of 100 ordinary criminals fresh from European jails. It certainly should have been possible to keep out the English ruffian whose brutality when not in the ring has been exceptionally offensive, even to pugilists. We have enough such criminals now, and Mitchell has threatened to make this country his permanent place of residence. If the immigration laws of the United States are not sufficient to exclude such an immigrant they are indeed defective and weak. (Cleveland Leader.)

MITCHELL VS. CORBETT. New York, Feb. 23.—Judging from latest developments, the Mitchell-Corbett fight will take place. Corbett's manager and Mitchell agreed to the fight. Mitchell has deposited a check for \$10,000 with a stakeholder satisfactory to both Mitchell and Brady. The match may be made tomorrow or Saturday.

SMOKESTACK SPARKS.

Going Out of the Emigrant Business—Sensible Provision in Record to Rest.

Trunk lines are discussing the advisability of doing away with the second-class passenger business.

The Big Four has gone out of the emigrant business and will hereafter charge full rates on all passengers.

The Central Railroad, of Georgia, has put on a fast train, "Nancy Hanks." It makes the run between Atlanta and Savannah in six hours and 35 minutes. The train is handled by new compound locomotives capable of making 80 miles per hour.

The Indiana House of Representatives has passed a bill providing that no company, in whole or in part within the State, shall permit or require any conductor, engineer, fireman or brakeman on any train who has worked in his respective capacity for 24 consecutive hours, excepting in case of casualty, to again go on duty or perform any work until he has had at least eight hours' rest.

The car shortage reported at Kansas City as bad as ever. The western roads are cramped for transportation facilities because eastern roads have been holding cars for storage purposes and in many cases for local business. The shortage is mounting up rapidly. Western roads are short about 500 cars a day.

An Anglican Clergyman Becomes a Catholic. NEW YORK, Feb. 23.—Rev. Jesse Albert Locke, who until last November was one of the assistants at St. John's Protestant Episcopal Church on Varick street, has gone over to the Church of Rome. As recently as Christmas Day he assisted in conducting the services in a London parish church.

Late Canadian News

Paris Has a Sensation—New Departure for the Military Schools.

The Orange Grand Lodge, in session at St. John, N. B., re-elected Geo. W. Fowler as grand master.

At Thursday's session in Montreal of the American Institute of Civil Engineers Henry M. Howe, of Boston, was elected president.

A Niagara Falls dispatch says the worst storm of the season set in last night and continued to-day. About two feet of snow has fallen.

The Canadian Society of Civil Engineers has elected as president E. P. Hannaford, of Montreal; W. J. Jennings, Toronto, is third vice-president.

The investigation of the \$2,800 Baie des Chaleurs matter demanded by Hon. Mr. Mercier was opened on Thursday in the public accounts committee at Quebec.

It is understood that among the changes to be made in the permanent military corps of the Dominion will be the appointment of soldiers and harness-makers to each mounted troop and battery at the various schools.

Geo. L. Edgett, who was walking on the track at Hall's Creek, Nova Scotia, on Wednesday, was struck by a train and instantly killed. Deceased was 40 years old, a school teacher, and brother of Rev. Gilbert Edgett, Methodist clergyman.

In response to the manifesto issued by Justin McCarthy, M.P., Hon. Edward Blake, M.P., and others, a public meeting of the citizens of Ottawa under the Gladstonian branch of the Irish National League, will be held on Friday evening.

The annual meeting of the Bell Telephone Company was held in Montreal Thursday. The gross revenue for the year was \$875,526, expenses \$655,139, net revenue, \$220,386, paid-up capital \$2,200,000. The old board of directors was re-elected.

Louis Lemay, constable, of Amherstburg, arrested Frank Kramer, jan. Newburg, and two companions at Petit Cote Wednesday night, on the charge of stealing 300 pounds of wool from J. W. Bailey, ran across the ice, and it is feared he was drowned.

The Quebec Legislature committee on privileges and elections are investigating the alleged charges against Mr. Bourdon, M. P. P. for Saguenay, who is accused by Marcoux with having drawn \$1,714 from the Crown Lands Department in his name without any authority from him. His friends are confident he will clear himself.

The dead body of a female child apparently only about three or four days old, was found on the front door step of the house occupied by Mr. George Hayden, at St. Paul, on Wednesday night. On a piece of paper pinned to the child's coverings was written the following: "Please bury this child in Paris graveyard. Its name is Bertha. Its mother lives in Brantford." An inquest will be held.

AN INFAMOUS CRIME!

A Man Burns His House, Cremating His Wife and Child, to Secure Insurance Money.

OTTUMWA, Iowa, Feb. 23.—The fire which destroyed Adolf Neise's house and cremated his wife and infant, proves, on evidence developed before the coroner's jury, to have been the result of an infamous crime. Neise and his wife's sister, Hattie Fantz, have been arrested.

The children's story is to the effect that their mother was lying on her face at the time the fire was discovered; that the floor was sprinkled with what looked like water (supposed to be kerosene), and that the father covered up their faces so that they could not see the flames.

Mrs. Neise's life was insured for \$5,000.

WILL BE CLOSED!

Defeat of the Measure to Open the Columbian Exhibition on Sundays.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23.—The Sunday fight is over, and the Sunday closers have won. Early in the contest it was seen that a defeat of the Hank Bill for opening the gates of the Columbian exhibition on Sunday was sealed, and realizing that Chairman Durbin would ask the Sunday closing committee if they would consent to a bill simply authorizing the opening of the gates of the exhibition but keeping all the buildings closed. They wanted everything shut up. They wouldn't consent to the people even walking about the grounds, and, greatly disappointed, Mr. Durbin adjourned the meeting.

The directors of the fair, who were nearly all in favor of keeping the gates open on Sunday. The national commissioners, with a few notable exceptions, also favored Sunday opening. Another move may be made to repeal the law.

OWNERS OF THE UNITED STATES

Mr. Vanderbilt owns 2,000,000 acres of land. The Standard Oil Company holds the title clear to a round million acres of land.

Mr. Dismont, of Pennsylvania, is the possessor of broad acres to the number of about 4,000,000.

The California millionaire Murphy owns 4,000,000 acres of land, which is equal to an area of the State of Massachusetts.

The Schenley estate owns 200 acres within the limits of Pittsburgh and Allegheny cities, from which the heirs draw \$1,000,000 annually.

There are 21,000,000 acres of United States land owned by foreign noblemen, who are not citizens of the United States, owe no allegiance to the Government, and spend their money elsewhere.

More land is owned by railroad companies (211,000,000 acres) than would make up the State of Iowa. Since 1861, not less than 131,000,000 acres of land have been given to railway companies, of which the Illinois Central got a subsidy of 2,500,000 acres.

Lord Scully, of Ireland, owns (according to United States laws) 90,000 acres of farm land in Illinois. These lands he parcels out to small tenants, who turn over the bulk of their earnings to their foreign landlord, his income from that source being \$200,000 per annum.

And the C. P. R. and other monopolists virtually own the Dominion of Canada. Millions of acres of Dominion lands are owned by resident and foreign landlords. America is fast becoming a country populated by tenants in city and country.

They were taken in the act of carrying a corpse from the grave yard. Police officers at the point of their revolvers made the five men get into one hack with the corpse and all were taken to police headquarters.
