August Belmont's purchase of the English stallion Rock Sand, a triple crown winner in that he captured the Two Thousand Guineas, Derby and St. Leger all in his 3-year-old campaign, has caused a sensation among 'American turfmen. Mr. Belmont negotiated the deal by cable and practically put no limit on the price to be paid. Rock Sand was secured for \$125,-500. Mr. Belmont's agent, it is said, outbidding no less a person than Edmund Blanc, the noted French turfman and breeder, who paid \$187,000 for Flying Fox some time ago. Rock Sand is undoubtedly the greatest horse in England. He was the property of the late Sir James Miller, for whom he won many of the historic turf classics. He is a 5-year-old, by Sainfoin (also a Derby winner) out of Roquebrune, and though beaten he has never been unplaced. He has started 20 times in stakes, winning sixteen of them, finishing second once and third three times. His capture of the Two Thousand Guineas, Derby and St. Leger as a 3-year-old made him a triple grown winner, of which there have been only six in 128 years.

Rock Sand, as a 2-year-old, won the Bedford Stakes, the Woodcote Stakes, the Coventry Stakes, the Chesterfield Stakes and the Champagne Stakes. He was second to Flotsam in the Middle Park Stakes and then won the Dewhurst Plate. In addition to his triple crown triumph, he captured the Bennington Stakes the following year, also the St. James' Palace Stakes, after which he ran third in the Eclipse, which was won by the celebrated mare Sceptre. As a 4-year-old Rock Sand began by finishing third in the Coronation Stakes, but he quickly showed his worth by defeating Sceptre in the Hardwicke. After that the great horse was victorious In the Princess of Wales, the Lingfield Park, the First Foal and the Jockey Club Stakes, which ended his career on the track. In all of these line-ups Rock Sand was ridden by Danny Maher, the American Jockey.

Long should be able to give a satisfactory account of himself at second if his arm holds out, but Frick and Lord will have to do some tall hustling to substantiate their claim to the guardianship of the third bag, as the Eastern League is very much faster than the company to which they have been accustomed. Tamsett will be light for shortstop, and it is a question if he will hold that position flown for the season. In the outfield, White is the only one upon which much reliance may be placed at the moment. Becker, Hurlburt, Crosby and Riggs have still to prove their worth.-News.
