BUCKET BRIGADE FOR PORT STANLEY

Port Stanley, Feb. 16.—The village will soon have a system of fire protection. The council decided Monday to take a start by the purchase of two ladders and 50 buckets. As there was only a surplus of \$19.29 in the treasury at the end of the fiscal year, it is possible a post-ponement of the adoption of a modern system. The establishing of a system of domestic water supply, which was negotiated a year or so ago by the ratepayers, would allow for the proper protection of property and materially reduce the cost of insurance in many lines in the village.

FATHER NAGEL APPOINTED

Will Be One of the Holy Angels Church at St. Thomas.
St. Thomas, Feb. 16.—Father Nagel, recently ordained, has been appointed assistant to Father West of the Church of the Holy Angels here. Father Nagel will retain his office of the parish. The growth of the church has necessitated the additional appointment, and the largely increased revenue has justified the nomination of Father Nagel, who comes from the city possessing much that will aid him in his people, and popularize him with his congregation.

MISSING TUG SAFE

United States Naval Craft Nina Reported All Right.

Newport News, Va., Feb. 16.—Bound for the coast for Boston, with a stay-along rig on the forward derrick, the little naval tug Nina, which has been missing since Feb. 6, was sighted Feb. 12 off Cape Cod. The tug was towed by the whaler Bayview, which arrived here yesterday from Cape Cod.

Capt. Cummings, of the Bayview, said that the Nina was apparently all right, that she flew no distress signals, and as he did not know of the anxiety about her safety, he merely saluted the tug and continued on his way. In the opinion of Capt. Cummings, the Nina put into the Delaware breakwater for shelter on the night of Sunday, Feb. 6, and remained there until the weather set in last Saturday. The tug was last sighted off Fenwick Island Monday, not far from the breakwater, and shipping men here are inclined to Capt. Cummings' theory.

At the rate of speed she was making when he passed her, Capt. Cummings figures that the Nina should reach Boston early today.

HARDWARE CONVENTION COST OVER \$1,000

Secretary A. M. Hunt Points Out
That It Was Money Well
Spent.

Mr. A. M. Hunt writes: "Now that the city hall and arcade have been cleared of the exhibits in connection with the recent hardware convention, it might not be out of place for us as citizens to learn some lessons from the same. It is acknowledged by all who visited the exhibition that it was a success. From the first there was perfect harmony, not only in committees, but when the actual work of the exhibition came on, each firm was desirous of being fair to other exhibitors, the result of which was that all were satisfied and pleased. The only difficulty we had to face was the lack of room, but our council did the best they could for us. It may not be generally known that the expenses of the convention were over \$1,000, which sum was willingly paid by the retail hardware merchants, wholesale firms, manufacturers, and others interested in the business. This is where the real 'boost' for London comes in.

The work for the coming convention and show is well under way, and it may be interesting to know that within the next two weeks over 14,000 letters will be sent throughout the Dominion from the Atlantic to the Pacific, and also across the border, inviting visitors to come to London the last week of March. Let the citizens of London get behind this proposition, and, by doing so, we are doing well towards it—and we will see in the near future good results in a larger London.

MONK HAS PETITION FOR NAVY PLEBISCITE

Quebec Conservative Leader Says
His Constituents Want Some
Such Test.

Ottawa, Feb. 16.—Yesterday P. D. Monk presented a number of petitions from his constituents asking that a plebiscite be taken as to the advisability of proceeding with the construction of the Canadian navy.

Mr. MacDonald, of Pictou, N. S., resumed the naval debate with a sharp criticism of the Conservatives, and was especially effective in his attack on Mr. Borden's stand.

Mr. MacDonald stated that the question of naval defence was never brought until the Liberal party came into power. The Canadian policy was laid down by Sir Wilfrid Laurier in 1902, and that policy was now being adhered to by Mr. Borden and Mr. Foster, on the other hand, wanted to pay tribute to the old policy in Philadelphia.

Dr. Roche said that as a Conservative he disagreed with Mr. Monk.

O. Scully, Wentworth, and A. S. Goodwin, Kootenay, also spoke.

A JUG OF WHISKEY STARTS A BIG BLAZE

Five Gallons Intended for a Wedding Celebration Explodes in a New York House.

New York, Feb. 15.—Seven persons were injured, three of them probably fatally, in two fires in crowded dwellings here today. Both fires were marked by heroic rescues by police and firemen. Flames from one of the burning buildings, a Jefferson street tenement, threatened the Israelite hospital, nearby, and a panic among the patients was averted only by the cool-headedness of physicians and attendants.

Several persons were burned in the Jefferson street fire, the spread of which was hastened by the explosion of a five-gallon jug of whiskey, which a family of tenants had bought for a wedding celebration today. There was a panicky rush for the fire escapes, but flames shooting out from the windows, cut off escape by these means, and firemen had to raise ladders to get down numbers of the imperilled occupants, who were unable to escape by the stairways. Groping through smoke-filled halls, and rushing through blazing rooms, rescuers carried six persons out on ladders. All were badly burned and two will probably die.

Six persons were rescued from a threatening blaze in a Tenth avenue boarding-house. The conditions in the Jefferson street fire were largely duplicated here, police and firemen picking up and carrying out unconscious occupants from several of the rooms. One man's condition is so serious that it is feared he will die. The damage to neither of the buildings was heavy.

DOMINION ALLIANCE

The Ontario Branch Gathering For Annual Convention at Toronto.

Toronto, Ont., Feb. 15.—Delegates in large numbers are arriving in the city today for the annual convention of the Ontario branch of the Dominion Alliance, which opens here tomorrow. About 500 in all are expected. An executive session will be held this evening, a local option conference will be held tomorrow morning, and the convention will be formally opened in the afternoon. The convention will debate the objectionable three-fifths clause, and also will prepare a militant programme of action for the coming year.

NEW TUCKETT FACTORY.

Hamilton, Feb. 15.—It was announced this morning that the Tuckett Clear Company had decided to concentrate its entire business in Hamilton. This will mean the abandonment of its Montreal branch, and the removal of 400 men to the city. The company, it is understood, intends to erect a new factory costing \$100,000. The board of control has granted the company a fixed assessment of \$10,000.

TO MEET ROOSEVELT.

New York, Feb. 15.—Mrs. Theodore Roosevelt and her daughter Miss Ethel, sail today on the steamer Hamburg to meet Colonel Roosevelt early in March at Khartoum. No confirmation could be obtained this morning of reports that Mr. Roosevelt would return earlier than has been announced, in the case of the engagement of his son, Theodore, Jun.

Recalls Wilde Case

Lord Douglas Tells Why He Stuck to the Discredited Author.

London, Feb. 15.—The trial of the libel suit of Sir Henry Walpole Manners-Sutton, son of Viscount Canterbury, and senior partner in a religious publishing firm, against W. H. Crossland, the editor of the Academy, was resumed in the Old Bailey this morning. The suit is based on articles printed in the Academy which reflected on the moral character of the plaintiff.

Mr. Crossland again took the stand. He declared that a girl to whom Manners-Sutton paid \$5,000, had been got out of the way in order to prevent her being called by the defence. The girl is supposed to be in Philadelphia.

Lord Alfred Douglas, the next witness, acknowledged that he had written a letter to the plaintiff, in which he called him a "barbarian". He said that subsequent events showed that he was justified in using this language.

In reply to questions by counsel, who recalled his lordship's connection with the Oscar Wilde case, the witness said he resented his father's interference with his friendship for Wilde, because his father had at the time been divorced from his mother for six years, and the ordinary relations of father and son did not exist between them.

Wilde, after he was released from prison, came to him at Naples and said: "You are the only friend I have. If you leave me I will go straight to hell."

The witness, therefore, stuck to Wilde until the latter died and paid his funeral expenses. He had no regrets for his action in this matter.

Lieut. Lari, a French officer, who was recently convicted of abducting from his torpedo boat, taking with him the ship's money, made an attempt to commit suicide in prison by swallowing pounded glass.
