Scarcity on Market Today Sent Figures Up-Potatoes

The rise in the price of strawberries was the feature of the market today. Early in the day the prices were 9c 10c per box wholesale and 11c and 12c retail, but later in the morning the prices rose to 9c and 11c wholesale, and 11c to 121/2c retail, due to the small supply offered. Predictions are that the strawberry crop this year will be very large, and the prices are expected to drop during the next week. Gooseberries were sold for

Hay and straw prices were the same Mexican L. and P. as earlier in the week, although one Monarch, load of hay brought \$18 per ton, and a load of straw was sold for \$10. These loads, however, were of exceptionally good quality

Potatoes were plentiful, but the demand and sales were very slow, although the prices were very low. Considering the prices that have prevailed until lately. The retail price was \$1 80 to \$1 90, and \$1 65 to \$1 75 was the price asked for wagon loads. Vegetables were plentiful, but there were changes in the prices of only two kinds, spinach and beets
