Following out the attempt of several counties in Western Ontario to establish one industrial farm in lieu of maintaining separate and distinct county jails, Mr. Hanna brought in a bill empowering several county or municipal councils to enter into an agreement under the approval of the inspector of prisons to establish and maintain an industrial farm. It is provided that where this is done each council shall appoint one member for a term of three years to serve on the board of management of such institution, who, together with the sheriff of the county in which the farm is situated, shall have charge of the place. In situations where the industrial farm is established for one county only, the sheriff of the county, where the farm is situated is appointed superintendent.






