

## TEMPERATURE GOES DOWN DR. THOMAS CROSBY EGG PRICES GO UP DIED IN VANCOUVER

Rule of Variance of These Two  
Things Once More Exemplified  
On the Local Market.

There are two much-talked of and entirely dissimilar things that are always at variance. When one is up, the other is down. They are the price of eggs and the temperature.

During the past two weeks, the weather has been exceptionally mild for January, and as a result the "egg producers" had quite made up their minds to lay in abundance, and so provide the housewife with enough eggs to bring down the price to a decent figure at least.

No sooner had the "union" decided on this altogether noble resolution, than the weather man, who had been quietly lying low, started in to demonstrate his so-called magnanimity by serving up a brand of weather which knocked the egg prices higher than the proverbial kite.

The past week has seen the price of the "hen fruit" at 28 to 40 cents, the low point of the winter. Today, with an offering of "mild" on the local market, there is a decided change. Retail prices are hard to gather, but from market indications, eggs will sell in the vicinity of 43 to 45 cents, which is "warm" change.

The egg situation in London, as witnessed in the past month, has been a game that would appeal strongly to a tendency. That there will be more "thrillers" there is no question, and the present cold snap is of considerable duration, eggs may again "hit the high spots," at 50 cents.

## WOLVES THREATEN CATTLE IN ITALY

Extreme Cold Driving Them  
From Mountains—Snow In  
France.

The temperature dropped yesterday in many places to 23 degrees below zero.

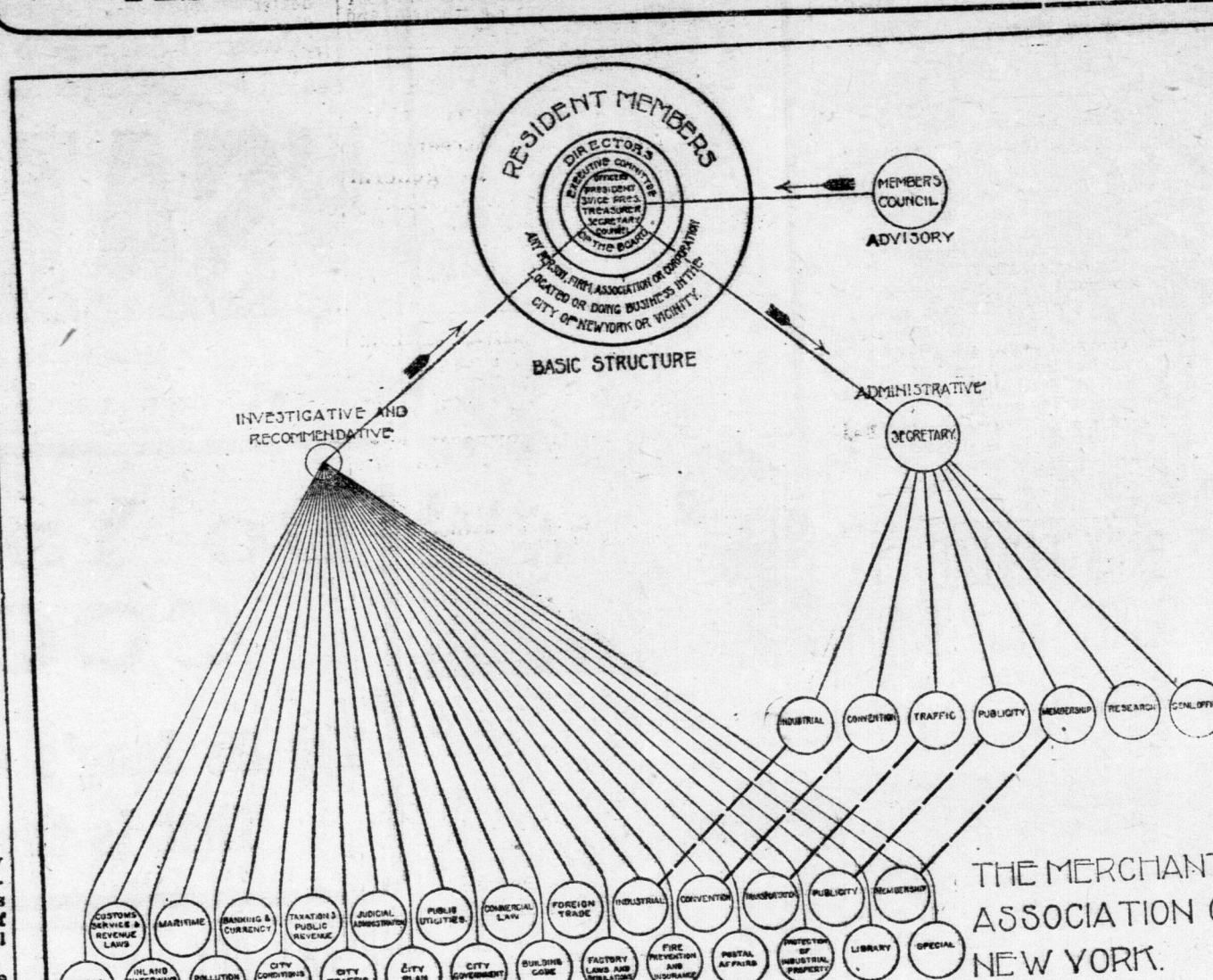

## NEW YORK'S MERCHANTS' ASSOCIATION ORGANIZATION

The above diagram shows the plan of organization of the Merchants' Association of New York, a commercial body with aims and objects similar to the London Industrial Bureau, although, of course, very much more complicated and covering a greater variety of activities than is contemplated here. This association has recently issued a 1913 Year Book, containing reports of the conspicuous achievements of the past year. Among these is the report of the industrial bureau, as yet less than a year old, which has well under way preparatory work which will make it one of the most complete institutions of its kind. Its creation was the result of an extensive study of local industrial conditions, resulting in the collection, collation and filing of a vast amount of statistical and other information. These include values of New York real estate, available manufacturing sites, new improvements planned and underway, transportation facilities, location of labor supply in each industrial group, etc. After this came the industrial survey or analysis proper, made in the light of the existing conditions, which advantages and disadvantages which they find where located; the amount of goods shipped to different parts of the United States and abroad; the amount of goods arriving in New York from outside points; the amount of water transportation and the character of the labor supply.

**Knows All Advantages.**  
Service of inestimable value based upon this information is afforded. The bureau knows what disadvantages New York has to offer manufacturers, and what disadvantages manufacturers already in that city are laboring under. To preserve and enhance the former, and to lessen and mitigate the latter, are among the functions of this bureau.

Preparation is now being made by the industrial commissioner here for a somewhat similar, although much less elaborate, industrial analysis, to aid the work of the London Industrial Bureau. The co-operation of local merchants, manufacturers and transportation companies will be asked in this work, by supplying certain information which will give the new manufacturing variety of activities of the bureau complete and accurate data regarding the local industrial situation, so that the work of placing new industries will be facilitated, and their efforts directed in the most profitable way.

**Complete Record.**  
If the required assistance is given, as will be recorded in letters sent out, the bureau will be able to have on file a complete record of such manufacturing enterprises together with all products manufactured by each; a list of all semi-finished products and parts of all commodities sold, and a list of all finished goods, from which can be prepared a record of allied industries which would find manufacturing profitable in London, etc.

From wholesalers and transportation companies an effort will be made to secure complete lists of commodities marketed in and from London, which might with profit be made here, along with approximate amount of these commodities sold, so that trades manufacturing these lines in the United States and elsewhere, may be provided with definite information regarding the possibilities in any line of industry, and to securing factories for which openings are apparent. Information secured from this source will be used only in the aggregate, and will be regarded as strictly confidential so far as individual houses are concerned. Owing to the fact that London is not on the sea-board, an accurate record of imported articles required cannot be obtained, as many goods sold by local

houses are received from eastern countries, and appear on the customs reports elsewhere.

**Competition Never Keener.**  
Competition between cities for commerce was never so keen as at the present time, and it will be more in the future than it is today. Thinking citizens all over the continent are realizing more than ever they did before that natural resources and advantages, in and of themselves, will not bring new industries or commercial expansion. They are appreciating more and more that it requires the service, the thought and money of men to build a city and build it right. With this appreciation there is a rapidly increasing movement to establish and maintain community organizations upon a sound business basis. The day has gone by when it is reasonable to question the value to a city of liberally supported, aggressively managed federation of citizens, and the time is at hand when the businessman and professional man asks himself whether he can afford to stay out, rather than whether he can afford to support such an organization.

The city is incorporated for mutual benefit. Mutual municipal service therefore concerns the citizens, because it influences the growth and development of the institution named the City of London, of which he is a part owner. Mutual municipal service is service of men who are big enough to realize that many women and children, and half as many of the city sent out this week by serving the city is serving themselves. Most of the citizens who go after a thing worth while, usually get what they set out for.

To bring work of this kind to a successful issue financial support is required. The city council and the board of trade will give substantial aid, and individual businessmen and firms have volunteered sums varying from \$2 to \$150. A circular letter to all business men of the city sent out this week by the industrial commissioner urges their co-operation as an investment for the common good.

The afternoon was one of the most pleasant and from an artistic standpoint, most creditable of the season.

## CAGE DROPPED 100 FEET THREE MINERS KILLED

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## LEGISLATURE WILL HEAR MINERS' VIEWS
