WOULD SEEM EASY TO RAISE NEW BATTALIONS IF PRESENT RECRUITING RUSH CONTINUES

More Than Score of Men Come to Camp Here to Join Present Battalions During Past 24 Hours, Indicating Spirit of District in Enlisting.

"No word yet of the new battalions." This is the official word handed out at divisional headquarters today. Save for the press dispatches concerning the two new infantry units that are to be raised in this division, nothing has been heard of them by the headquarters staff.

Just as a sample of how it would be possible to raise these new units, the officers are pointing to the way recruits are coming in for the present battalions. Twenty-one more recruits were sworn in by the 33rd yesterday and this morning. At a rate such as this it would soon be possible to raise two or three new battalions, for there is no active recruiting propaganda, the men being taken on simply as they come to the mobilization camp.

With a score and more daily applying for enlistment at one centre alone, it is pointed out that with recruiting officers over the entire division and

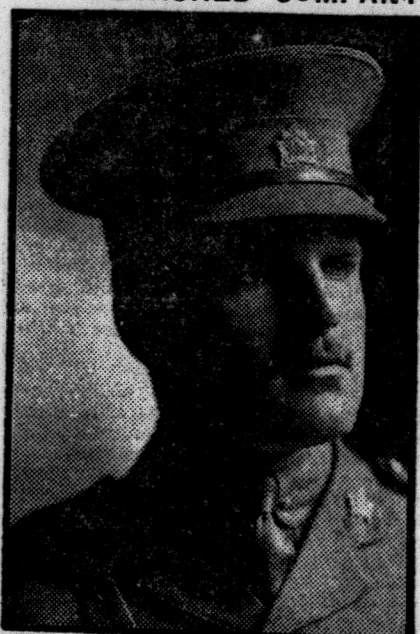
A brother, Eric, has just completed his captain's course at the Wolsey Barracks.

WILL COMPLETE BATTERY ORGANIZATION SHORTLY

Major Coghlan Accepts Command of New Overseas Unit.

COMES HERE SHORTLY

Will Announce Staff After Conference With Col. Shannon.

Organization of the new 29th Battery, Canadian Field Artillery, for service overseas, will be completed within a few days, it is expected. Major F. T. Coghlan, commander of the 11th Howitzer Battery of Guelph, who was offered the command of the 29th, has been accepted and is expected to arrive in London within the course of a few days for a conference with Col. L. W. Shannon, divisional officer commanding.

The staff of the 29th and the arrangements for its recruiting will not be made public until after this conference.

Nothing has yet been decided as to where the battery will be enlisted in the first place and where it will be trained in the second. Toronto dispatches say that all of the batteries of Canada's latest contingent are to be trained at Petawawa camp. Headquarters here knows nothing about such an arrangement.

It has been pointed out that there has been no staff named for the Petawawa camp as yet, and this may mean that the preliminary training of the 29th will be done in this city.

Capt. A. A. Keene Will Give Men Real Training.

No. 16 Company, Canadian Army Service Corps, under the command of Capt. A. H. Keene, will parade, full strength, from the armories at 8 p.m. Saturday, June 12. After a two-hours' march they will bivouac, and return not later than 10 p.m. to the armories.

There are some real high-class ball heavers in the officers' messes of the battalions and a battle royal is assured.

NEW CREDIT VOTE

Discussion to Take Place in Commons Tuesday Next.

[Canadian Press.] London, June 10.—3:50 p.m.—Premier Asquith announced in the House of Commons this afternoon that a further report of credit would be discussed on Tuesday of next week.

13,000 ENEMIES AT LARGE.

[Canadian Press.] London, June 10.—Because of inadequate internment facilities there still are 9,000 Germans and 4,000 Austro-Hungarians of military age at large in the metropolitan area. These are official figures which were made public today.

THE DIARY OF MARS

Capture of the Austrian town of Montefalco is announced in an official communication from Rome. Gen. Cadorna, Italian chief of staff, reports that the town was occupied after stubborn fighting along the Isonzo River. Montefalco lies three miles east of the river, and about an equal distance north of the Gulf of Trieste. It is sixteen miles northwest of the city of Trieste, against which the Italian invasion presumably is directed. Possession of Montefalco would be of strategic importance to the Italians, particularly as that point is connected by railroad with Trieste. The latest mention of the town in official Austrian dispatches was in last night's report, which said an Italian attack in that vicinity had failed.

At various points along the Isonzo sharp fighting has occurred, and several successes for the Italians are announced, but it is conceded the Austrians still hold dominating positions.

Uninterrupted successes for the Austrians and Germans in Galicia are claimed in Vienna, where it is said the advance south of the Dniester is continuing. In Central Galicia, however, the Russians apparently are resisting the advance with more success.

German submarines have sunk two more British trawlers. The crews of both vessels were rescued.

A Berlin dispatch concedes the Germans lost one vessel, a collier, in the Baltic engagement of last week, and that a destroyer was damaged. It is asserted in Petrograd that a German transport and torpedo boat were sunk.

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CANADIAN MUNITIONS INSPECTED BY MORGANS

Lord Devonport Tells House of Lords Makers Object.

[Special Cable to The Advertiser.] London, June 10.—In the Lords' debate on the munitions bill, Lord Devonport said he understood munitions from Canada had to be inspected by Morgans, of New York, who also inspected munitions made in the States. Canadians who had offered shells to make for the Government objected to having to pass their goods through the American house.

Earl Curzon, on behalf of the Government, promised to inquire.

Lord Stalbridge, who has come back from the front, said the men there did not think much about when the war would end. The main thought was when would the people of Britain wake up and give us the amount of guns we require. Our guns are capable of firing millions of rounds every twenty-four hours, but he did not say this amount of ammunition was required every day.

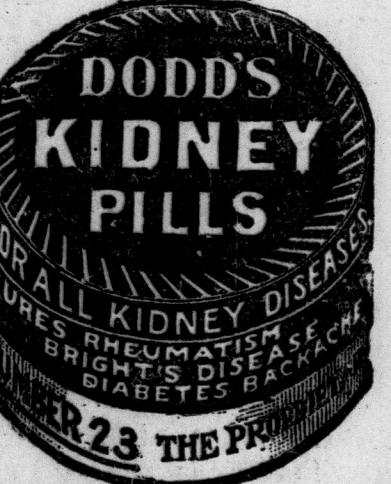
