

FIXED PRICE FOR ALL PAVEMENTS

Council Accepts Bulk Bid of
\$2.28 Per Square
Yard.

MANY BYLAWS PASSED

City Will Start Paving Work
Immediately To Provide
Employment.

The city council, at a special meeting last evening, decided to accept the tender of the Standard Paving Company for the balance of the street paving work to be done this season at \$2.28 a square yard. Some doubt was expressed as to the legality of letting the contracts without specifying which streets were to be done, but Controller Moore stated that the same contract had been let in other years and in other cities. The acceptance of the tender is to be made conditional on the acceptance by the contractors of payment in the form of city debentures.

Starting Paving at Once.
On a motion by Ald. Donnelly, the council decided to commence work on York, Talbot, Waterloo and King streets immediately.

The city engineer's report of the pavement work for which bylaws have been passed and contracts let, Coburn, Queen's to King; Maitland, Queen's to King; Ridout, Craig to Ferguson; Ridout, Ferguson to Garfield; William, King to Dundas; William, Dundas to Queen; Maitland, King to York; Edward, Elmwood to Bruce; Elmwood, Edward to Wharncliffe and Wortley to Edward.

Governor of Jail Will Have One for Next Six Months.

BE-FEZED LONDONERS GOING TO SEATTLE

Mocha Temple Will Be Officially Represented at the Imperial Council.

At least three officially appointed delegates, and possibly other Shriners of Mocha Temple, will leave here on Thursday, July 8, for Seattle, Wash., to attend the forty-first session of the Imperial Council, which opens in the western city on the 13th. The delegates are Potentate W. W. Gammage, Recorder W. H. Abbott and Dr. Routledge of Lambeth.

The London contingent will journey to the west with the Detroit delegation, which is to be accompanied by its motor patrol and band and which will charter a special train for the purpose. At the conclusion of the session, which is to last for three days, most of the delegates, including those from Mocha Temple, will tour the southwest, taking in the California Exposition.

While in Seattle the visitors will be entertained on a lavish scale by the Seattle nobles. The program of social events arranged for their delectation include balls, luncheons, lawn fetes, barbecues, excursion trips and many other features of a similar nature.

SUGGESTS EAST SIDE AS PROPER STOP

Street Railway Manager Discusses One-Stop Idea For Main Corner.

Manager King of the street railway company appeared before the board of control yesterday prepared to give the company's side of the question of making cars stop on one side only of the Dundas and Richmond crossing. He was told that the matter would not come up until the next regular meeting, but before he went he mentioned that a census had been taken which showed that during the last week 14,300 people boarded cars at the east side of Richmond street to go east. This, he suggested, indicated that people preferred the east side.

Controller White said he had spoken to the owners of the old city hall property and he believed that they would agree to give to the city the flag pole and bell which went with the building when it was sold.

H. Fortey, 29 Emery street, claimed \$10 compensation on behalf of his son on account of damage done to the latter's bicycle and clothes when he was thrown by a sewer manhole projecting above the surface of the road on the north side of Oxford street. The claim was referred to No. 3 committee.

A tender was received from the London Engine Supply Company to install a sanitary drinking fountain in the board of control room for \$13. The board will recommend the acceptance of the offer.

A fully-signed petition, asking for a pavement on Duesch avenue between Edward and Wortley road was handed in, and will be submitted to council.

The Ontario Commercial Travellers' Association, with headquarters in this city, is in a more flourishing financial condition today than at any other time in its history. Although the names are somewhat similar the association is not identified in any way with the Western Ontario Commercial Travellers' Benefit Society, an organization that went into voluntary liquidation last week, owing to the number of death claims that fell due.

The Ontario association has a membership of about 1,000, and its future prospects are of the brightest.

URNS FIRST SOD

Student in Charge of Chelsea Green Church Officiated at Ceremony.

Sod was turned last evening at Chelsea Green for a handsome addition to the Holy Trinity Anglican Church. C. E. Foreman, B.A., of Huron College, who is in charge of the church, turned the first sod, and the work was continued by other members of the congregation. Work will be rushed on the addition, and it is expected that it will be ready for occupancy in the fall.

The retreat from the Dniester has ended, temporarily at least, on the Gniza Lipa river, which flows north and south before Rohatyn and which offers an exceptionally strong first defence. But military authorities do not expect heavy fighting along that river. They express the opinion that the next serious battle probably will occur along the Gniza Lipa, fifteen miles further eastward, where the Russians would benefit by the railroad with which the Tarnopol line connects.

POSITION EXTREMELY SATIS- FACTORY.

London, June 28.—The correspondent of the Daily News at Petrograd telegraphs: "The German armies have been detached to settle the troublesome Russians along the Dniester. The Russians have separated and rejoined along the River Gniza Lipa, holding Halicz and the southern limits of the Dniester. Since his failure to cover his rear, Field Marshal Von Mackensen began a tentative movement northward, but the Russians here are preparing for him."

"The highest authority in Petrograd describes the Russian position facing the Germans as extremely satisfactory."

CENTRE REFORMING.

London, June 28.—The Russian centre in Galicia is rapidly reforming behind the River Gniza Lipa before Gen. Von Linsingen's drive across the Dniester, but this retreat, in the opinion of London military critics, is almost entirely due to the battle in the Lemberg region where the positions of the Russians made retreatment inevitable. These movements have been almost continuous. The expected detachment of German troops from the east front for operations in the west evidently has not yet occurred. This probably is due to the stubborn Russian retreat and the increasing pressure of the Italians.

The advance of the Italians has been very slow, but if it is to be entirely stopped more Austrian troops must be all probability be transferred from the Galician line, unless Austria is willing to surrender the seaport of Trieste.

Anglo-French troops on the Gallipoli peninsula are heavily bombarding the Turkish right wing without result according to the Turkish official report, but the other side has not yet announced the conclusion of this operation.

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formed William Salt was coming back to Winnipeg. NEW ZEALAND READY TO FORM NATIONAL MILITARY MINISTRY

Premier Announces This and Opposite Leads to Time to Consider.

Massey announced in Parliament today that the New Zealand Government was prepared to form a national military ministry until the close of the war with a view to the whole energies of the country being concentrated in the prosecution of hostilities.

Sir Joseph Ward, the leader of the Opposition, asked time to consider the proposal.

SAYS NEITHER LAND UNDERSTANDS OTHER

Gerhard's Opinion of German-American Relations as Published.

[Canadian Press.] Berlin, June 28.—Dr. Anton Meyer, Gerhard, the attaché of the German colonial office, who was sent from the United States to Berlin by the German ambassador, Count Von Bernstorff, to explain the views of the United States regarding the Lusitania case, published an article in Der Tag today, "Germany and America," in which he says his experiences convinced him that both countries misunderstood each other.

FREE FROM SMALLPOX

City Has No Cases But Township Has Six.

For the first time in many months, London is entirely free of smallpox. There are, however, six cases in the township, just beyond the city limits. All are under close quarantine and every precaution is being taken to keep the disease from getting into the city. One of the township cases is quite severe, but all the patients are doing nicely and will recover.

"There is very little disease in the city," said Chairman Somerville, of the board of health, to The Advertiser today.
