

TANCREADE HAS ONLY WITNESS FOR CHARACTER

No Other Evidence Offered in Defence of Alleged Murderer.

ADDRESSES OF COUNSEL

Then Fate of Accused Goes For Decision To the Jury.

The trial of Mike Tancreade, charged with the murder of Raffaele Barbado, is drawing to a close, the evidence of witnesses being in all at noon, and with the addresses of counsel yet to come, it is expected that the case will go to the jury about 4 o'clock this afternoon.

Edmund Meredith, counsel for the defence, commenced his address to the jury at 1:30 this afternoon, and was followed by Prosecutor White, who was succeeded by his lordship's charge to the jury.

All day yesterday was taken up with listening to the evidence of a number of crown witnesses.

The jurors, who spent the night at the City Hotel, were brought into the courtroom and took their places in the jury-box at five minutes to ten.

Tancreade, the prisoner, was brought into the courtroom at one minute to ten. He evinced considerably more interest in the proceedings today than yesterday, and carefully followed the questions asked of the witnesses.

Son's Evidence.
Boniface Tancreade, son of Mike Tancreade, the prisoner, was the first witness called.

"What time did your father come home the 5th of April last?" asked Prosecutor White.

"About half-past nine," replied the witness.

"Did your father take his coat off?" "No; I took it off. It was heavy, and I hung up."

"Did you find anything in your father's coat?" "Yes, a revolver. I took it out and hid it in my pocket."

"What did you do with the revolver?" "I gave it to a policeman when he came."

Unloaded Revolver.
"What did you do with it?" "I unloaded it and took the cartridges out and gave them to a detective."

Cross-examined by Edmund Meredith, K.C., the witness stated that his father was drunk and singing at the time.

"Would your father have been able to take off his own overcoat?" "I think not, because he was drunk."

"You took the cartridges out of the revolver?" "Yes."

Sergeant John Monahan of the city police force was the second witness called. He testified that on Sunday, April 5th, he was called to No. 14 Hamilton road, where he found the prisoner, Mike Tancreade, and a woman named Barbado lying on the side of the road.

He asked for the revolver, and told him that he was drunk and singing at the time.

Cross-examined by Edmund Meredith, K.C., witness repeated that Tancreade was drunk at the time of his arrest.

Patrolman Malcolm Smith, a member of the city police force, gave evidence to the effect that he had accompanied Sergeant Monahan to the house of Tancreade, and had found the prisoner, Mike Tancreade, and a woman named Barbado lying on the side of the road.

He corroborated the evidence of Sergeant Monahan as to the finding of Barbado and the taking of the victim to the hospital.

He assisted in the undressing of Barbado at the hospital.

"Did you discover anything when Tancreade was undressed?" asked the prosecutor.

"Yes, a bullet dropped from his shirt."

What was the condition of Barbado?" "He was shot through the back and abdomen."

The bullet was produced by the prosecutor and identified by the witness as the one found in Barbado's shirt. Patrolman Smith stated that he had placed the letter "M" on the bullet for identification.

Tells of Arrest.
Detective Robert Egerton testified that he had been summoned to the hospital by Sergeant Monahan and afterwards had been to Tancreade's house, arriving at the place about 9:15 on the Sunday evening.

He found Tancreade in the kitchen with a revolver, and asked him for the revolver.

He found a box of cartridges in Tancreade's overcoat, the cartridge box being produced in court and identified by Detective Egerton.

The revolver was handed over to Sergeant Monahan, testified the witness, who further stated that he had given the revolver to the police.

Basis of Opinion.
"You are absolutely positive in your opinion?" asked Edmund Meredith, K.C.

The crown closed its case at fifteen minutes to twelve, and the defence opened its case at one o'clock.

The only witness for the defence was Andru Guidiceo, who gave evidence as to the character of the prisoner.

He testified that he and Tancreade came from the same town in Italy and that he had always known Tancreade to be a man of good conduct.

Court adjourned at 1:30 o'clock and resumed again at 1:30 when addresses from counsel were presented.
