As a matter of fact, there is not a very satisfactory way known of getting redress for a poor road. It is unfair to ask the ratepayers to accept and pay for it; it is unfair to ask them to pay more for having the work improved, and it is also unfair to ask other citizens to contribute for a road that is no concern of

theirs. The whole responsibility for such a situation goes back to the time of construction. There is no great secret in laying pavement. There are certain well-known principles to be followed, and if they are insisted upon results will come, and they will be satisfactory.


