OPPOSITION PREPARING

Washington, D. C., March 8.-With opposition forces organizing for the fray, the senate fight over the fourpower Pacific treaty promised to get into full swing today, when Senator Lodge, the Republican leader, delivered his speech in defence of the pact. Senator Robinson, Democrat, Arkansas, planned to follow Senato Lodge, in an address favoring his two proposed reservations to the treaty and it appeared likely that a general discussion would develop, terminat ing the preliminary lull which has marked the treaty debate so far.
