Toronto, March 13.—Government and U. F. O. leaders in the Legislaure agreed this afternoon that the report of the Gregory commission investigating hydro matters vindicated bublic ownership of Ontario's electrical development.

He commented on some portions of it, and told the house that the investigating commission had cost the province over half a million dollars. In the latter part of his adlress he maintained that the commisdon had been appointed by the Drury government to injure public owner-ship, but that it had been vindicated "even at the hands of its enemies."


