SPEEDED UP BY PREMIER

MacDonald Moves For Second Reading of Boundary Measure.

RESENTS CHARGE

Claims Object Not To Coerce Ulster, But To Fulfill Duties.

London, Sept. 30.—Prime Minister
MacDonald moved the second reading in the House of Commons today of the bill providing for the creation of an Irish boundary commission without the participation of Ulster. In making the motion the premier declared it was the essential duty of every government to fulfil its obliga-tions. He said he resented the

charge that the government's move was an attempt to coerce Ulster.

Mr. MacDonald contended that whatever government might be in power would find no other possible course than the one he had been purticular. suing. After reviewing the events leading up to the Anglo-Irish treaty, a vital part of which was the ad-justment of the boundary between Ulster and the Free State, he said that the important machinery for the boundary adjustment was faulty and that in consequence the whole legislation was jeopardized. The govern-ment was now seeking a remedy for original defect.

Herbert Asquith, former premier, and Liberal leader, declared that the Liberals would give the Irish bill their hearty and undivided support. 


