GRAND JURY URGES NEW NURSES' HOME

Recommendation Follows Inspection of Victoria Hospital—Laud Institutions.

The grand jury, empaneled for the December sessions of the county court, in making their presentation to Judge J. C. Judd yesterday afternoon, strongly recommended the building of a nurses' home at Victoria hospital. The jurymen visited the various public institutions and found them all in satisfactory condition.

Following is the presentation: "We, the members of the grand jury at the present sittings of the general sessions of the peace, beg leave to make the following presentation:

"We wish to thank your honor for the courteous way in which we were received and the clear manner in which we were instructed in the one case coming before us at this session.

"We have visited and inspected the several public institutions and beg leave to report as follows:

"We visited Victoria hospital on the afternoon of Dec. 2, where we received a very courteous reception from Dr. Cleeg and the other officers in charge of that institution.

"Accommodation lacking. We found that there were at present 219 patients in the hospital. We inspected all the different wards and kitchens and found everything in a clean and sanitary condition and well kept.

"We also find that the hospital is badly in need of more accommodation for the nurses and we strongly recommend the building of a nurses' home.

"On Dec. 3, at 10 o'clock a.m., we visited the Byron Sanatorium, where we were received by Dr. Pratt and his efficient staff of officers.

"We were escorted through all the buildings and inspected all the equipment, including the laundry, stable and grounds, and found everything in a spotless condition.

"There are at present 278 patients in the sanatorium, including 30 children in the preventorium, all of whom seem to be making good progress towards recovery. Twenty-one patients from the county of Middlesex were admitted last year.

"After inspecting the different buildings, Dr. Pratt kindly arranged a very fine dinner for the members of the grand jury, which was greatly appreciated.

"Buildings All Sanitary. "At 2 o'clock on the afternoon of Dec. 3, we visited the Victoria hospital, where we were received by Dr. Cleeg and his staff of officers.

"We found the appointments throughout the hospital in good condition, all the wards and cells clean and the stores properly kept, and we wish to congratulate Governor Dawson and his staff on the manner in which the hospital is conducted.

"We strongly recommend the changing of the toilet system and that the incoming county council will place this in their estimates for 1925.

"At 1:30 o'clock we visited St. Joseph's hospital, where we were received by Dr. Pratt and his staff of officers.

Gunman Caught Near the Prince

Canadian Press Despatch.

Montreal, Dec. 4.—For "loitering" with a loaded revolver near where the Prince of Wales was being entertained, during the latter's visit to Montreal a few months ago, George Brown, aged 24, was this morning sentenced by Recorder Semple to three months in jail and a fine of \$100, or another three months.

Dec. 3 we visited the Ontario hospital. "We were received by Drs. Robinson and Stevenson and staff, and were shown through the main building, hospital, stables and other buildings. We found every building in first-class sanitary condition and every effort being used to improve or cure the patients.

"The following is the number of patients at the hospital on Dec. 2, 1924: Men, 674; women, 652; total number of patients, 1,326.

"Admissions from Oct. 31, 1923, until Oct. 31, 1924: Men, 151; women, 165; total admissions, 316.

"Discharges from Oct. 31, 1923, until Oct. 31, 1924: Men, 96; women, 89; total discharges, 185.

"Deaths from Oct. 31, 1923, until Oct. 31, 1924: Men, 52; women, 52; total deaths, 104.

"We wish to make special mention of the building which has been overhauled and set aside for a nurses' home, and which is a great credit to Dr. Robinson, and we are sure will be greatly appreciated by the nursing staff at the hospital.

"This has been accomplished at a cost not exceeding \$2,500, and the work being done chiefly by the staff of workmen at the hospital.

"Would Alter Jail Toilet. "At 9:45 a.m. today we visited the county jail. We were received courteously by Governor Dawson and other jail officials, also by Mrs. North, matron of the female department.

"We found the number of prisoners at the present time to be 32.

"We found the appointments throughout the jail in good condition, all the wards and cells clean and the stores properly kept, and we wish to congratulate Governor Dawson and his staff on the manner in which the jail is conducted.

"We strongly recommend the changing of the toilet system and that the incoming county council will place this in their estimates for 1925.

"At 1:30 o'clock we visited St. Joseph's hospital, where we were received by Dr. Pratt and his staff of officers.

"We found the appointments throughout the hospital in good condition, all the wards and cells clean and the stores properly kept, and we wish to congratulate Governor Dawson and his staff on the manner in which the hospital is conducted.

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INQUEST IS ORDERED INTO WOMAN'S DEATH

Inmate of Toronto Asylum Received Burns in General Hospital.

Toronto, Dec. 4.—Chief Coroner Dr. Graham has ordered an inquest into the circumstances surrounding the death of Mrs. Ethel Brown, aged 40, who died this morning at the hospital for the insane.

According to hospital authorities the woman was admitted to the Toronto general hospital and her case diagnosed as a mental one, a brain tumor said to have been the cause

of her illness. Two days later, they say, Mrs. Brown was placed in a special detention ward. Shortly afterwards she sustained burns about the body and legs through leaning against radiators in the room, and after medical treatment she was removed to the hospital for the insane.

J. C. Decker, superintendent of the general hospital, said this morning that Mrs. Brown was given every care while in the institution, and following representations by relatives and friends, the coroner decided to conduct an investigation to determine the cause of death.

SET NEW RECORD.

Montreal, Dec. 4.—A new record in the loading of grain at the lake head was established yesterday, according to figures received at Canadian National Railway's headquarters here this morning. A total of thirteen vessels were loaded with 2,753,000 bushels of grain.

UNITED STATES ASKS CANADIANS BE JAILED

Persons Who Refused To Answer Questions On Teapot Dome Charged.

Toronto, Dec. 4.—President Coolidge will be party to an action in the Ontario courts next Monday, when the United States government will ask for the commitment to jail of seven Canadians on the ground that they refused to answer questions concerning oil transactions put by United States acting Consul Harold Schantz in a special hearing recently

in connection with the Teapot Dome investigation. Consul Schantz had received recognition as a court from Mr. Justice Middleton, high court judge of Ontario.

The Canadians involved are H. S. Osler, K.C., Britton Osler, Suhneva Margaret Fordyce, Louis Samuels, Morley H. Brundage, N. E. Strickland and Harold E. Boston, constituting the Continental Trading Company of Canada. They are charged with refusing to answer certain questions as to whether or not liberty bonds passed from oil interests to certain public officials in the United States.

G. W. Mason, K.C., of Toronto, was counsel for the United States.

McGILL INCREASES ASSETS.
