



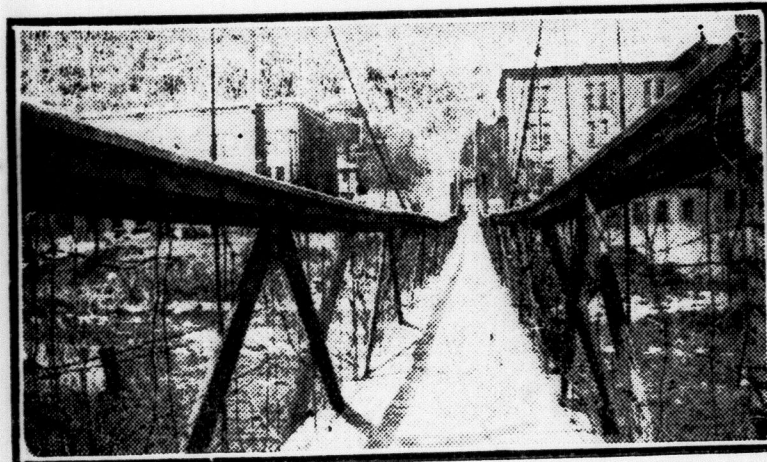

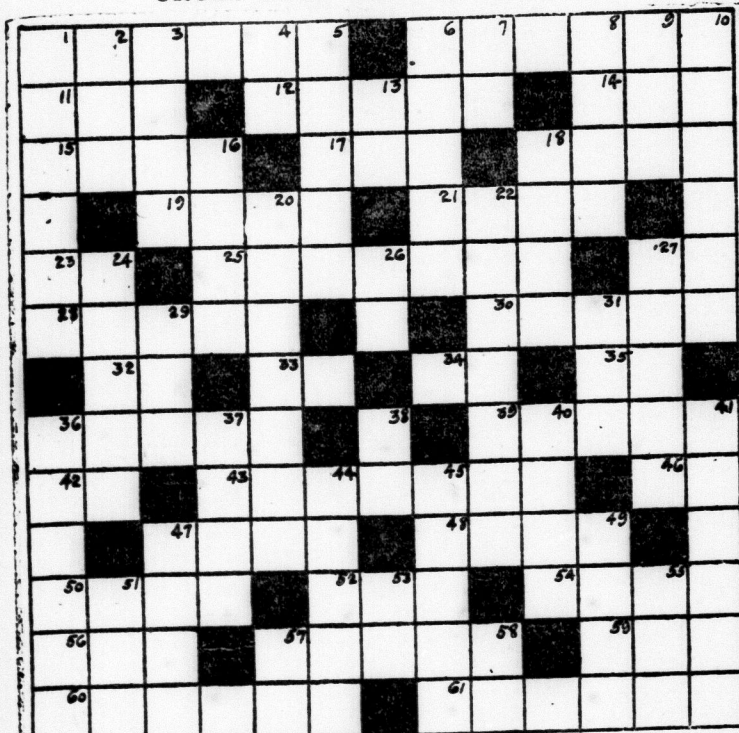


Sir Thomas Lipton, most famous of yachtsmen, congratulates the skipper of the Shamrock after the latter's victory at the Cowes regatta.
