Preparations for the Reception of the New Governor-General at Quebec.

De Degrois, Nationalist, Elected in Sherbrooke by De-Devoigne and Constable Bureau for completion of the Five-Parties-Quebec's Financial Policy.

The Absconded Election. MONTREAL, May 18.—The election in Sherbrooke to fill the vacancy in the legislative assembly to-day resulted in the return of Dr. Degrois, national, by about 150 majority over Savans, conservative. At the general election the late member received but seventy-four majority.

The Grand Trunk Embankment. A special term of the court of Queen's Bench to try R. Devoigne and Constable Bureau for completion of the Grand Trunk Embankment at Sherbrooke began to-day. Nearly the whole day was spent in getting a jury to attend to the case.

Want to Remove Chief Justice. A long conference was held this afternoon between the fire authorities and the fire committee of the city council. The insurance men want a new chief appointed to replace Chief Justice, who is being considered as being too old, and also demand the removal of one per cent. of the sub-city. If this is done they promise to pay the city a sum of money recently made in insurance rates.

Preparations for Stanley. QUEBEC, May 18.—The new governor-general, Lord Stanley of Preston, will be sworn in to-day at his residence here in about three months. One of his aides-de-camp is already here and the gubernatorial retinue will arrive next week. Cavalry officers have been ordered to vacate their quarters in the citadel which will be once made ready for Lord and Lady Stanley's reception.

Quebec Public Accounts. The public accounts for the fiscal year ending 30th June, 1887, show the total receipts for the twelve months to have been \$4,638,102, round figures.

Reducing Expenses. TORONTO, May 18.—At a meeting of the executive committee to-day the estimates were cut down to a sum which will have the effect of reducing taxation from 15¢ to 10¢ on the dollar to 14¢. The proposed cut means an increase of civic officials, amounting to some \$5,000, has been cut off.
