(Whitehorse, Y. T., Dec. 18.—Special) —Harry Baxter, Ole Dixon, A. D. Patrick and B. Beedeen have returned from Bullion and Vulcan creeks.

Several outfits were met on the trail by the miners carrying supplies and tools to the ground staked early last summer.
