A Commercial Case Involving \$4000. The whole of the day was spent yester day in the assize court before Judge Galt without a jury in hearing the case of Hamburger against Williams, Silliman, Levian et al. This was a commercial case growing out of the failure of the firm of Levian. Hamburger & Co. Mrs. Julia Hamburger of Philadelphia is the plaintiff. Her son Simon was a member of the firm, and last year she advanced \$4000 to him, which she claims was used in liquidating the firm's liabilities. Shortly after the loan Simon Hamburger withdrew from the business, and the co-defendant, Silliman, entered. The remaining partners elsimed that the \$4000 advanced by Mrs. Hamburger is a private liability of her own son's, with which the the present firm have nothing to do. The plaintiff disputes this contention, and sues for \$4000, the smount of the promissory note. The defendant, Silliman, holds that the note was not among the firm's liabili-ties when he entered the partnership, and therefore disolaims his responsibilities.
