SEVEN RACES AT SHEEPSHEAD BAY

Perfect Weather for the Opening Day—Comanche Flays With Spread Eagle in a Duel.

SHEEPSHEAD BAY, June 20.—The weather was perfect to-day and the course very pretty. The program was not a very good one. The events were evenly divided, the favorites winning three of them.

In the first race Shelley Tuttle was almost left at the post. Sirocco and Derfargilla alternated in the lead until the stretch was reached, when the former took the lead and holding it to the end won by three lengths. Lord Harry was second and Derfargilla third.

There were only two starters in the second race, Comanche and Spread Eagle. The former played with his opponent well and easily by three-quarters of a length.

In the third race led the others to the turn for home, where he seemed a sure winner, but George Beck came with a rush, followed by Tom Skidmore, and these two finished respectively first and second. Count came in third.

THE TORONTO SCULLERS AT HENLEY Ryan and Wright Have Done Themselves Proud in Practice Spins.

Messrs. John J. Ryan and Joseph Wright, the Toronto amateur scullers, have done themselves proud in their practice spins on the Thames, and this fact, with the most favorable reports about the pair that have regularly appeared in the London and other English papers already show the veteran Toronto Rowing Club's wisdom in sending their representatives across the Herring Pond.

In a letter Mr. Wright says: "I like my new boat very much, but think very little of the pair we got from Clasper; the rig does not suit us. However, we will do the best we can in it. We have seen all the scullers but the two Nickalls, the Frenchman and Dr. Boyd of Dublin. J. J. says we can trim anything we have seen so far, and I think so, too. I am going well, and so is John—not much difference between us so far."
