THE CANADIAN VIMY MEMORIAL CHURCH

Dear Mr. Editor,—

Your readers have certainly heard
of the plan to build at Lens, France,
a Vimy Memorial Church, as a sac-
red memorial to the 60,000 Cana-
dians fallen in Northern France dur-
ing the great war, and a gift to the
Protestants of that country, who
have lost one hundred and fifty of
their church buildings in the invaded
area, and are in the direst straits to
rebuild them.

We feel that we cannot rest until
we have put the question squarely to
the laymen of your town and asked
them if they are satisfied that their
town should remain outside of this
National movement.

We would suggest that a returned
officer take the lead and arrange a
meeting of ministers and laymen to
discuss the question and if possible,
an offering should be taken in all the
churches on the 10th of April which
corresponds to the fourth anniver-
sary of the Vimy Ridge victory or on
one of the following Sundays or that
a house to house visitation be organ-
ized by a local committee. Offering
envelopes may be sent on application
from the Headquarters of the Vimy
Memorial Church, campaign, 740
University street, Montreal.

If no local committee can be con-
stituted, private subscriptions might
be sent to the Honorary Treasurer,
Brig. General J. G. Ross, C.M.G.,
142 Notre Dame St. West, Montreal.

Your town will certainly join in
this patriotic and Christian enter-
prise and earn the honor of having
its name inscribed on the list of
Canadian cities and towns which
have contributed to the erection of
the Canadian Vimy Memorial
Church.

GERMANS BELIEVE THE ALLIES FEAR TO ENFORCE PEACE

Germany would have kicked the
whole top of the Allies head off if
Germany had won the war.

Germany still feels the top of her
own head secure in its place and
therefore, does not believe that the
Allies did win the war.

Germans imagine that there is
only one reason why the Allies did
not ask as much from the Huns as
the Huns would have asked from a
vanquished foe. The one reason is
written in Germany's failure to
recognize the Allies as a victorious
combatant or Germany as a van-
quished foe.

Argument to the effect that the
Allies won and Germany lost the
war must be addressed exclusively
to Germany's HIDE. Germany is
destitute of a HEART that is re-
sponsive to appeal and devoid of a
HEAD that is open to argument.

Germany would not deal as easily
with a defeated enemy as the Allies
are dealing with Germany unless
Germany were afraid of that enemy.
Germany is persuaded that the vic-
torious Allies would go as hard and
as far against a vanquished Germany
as a victorious Germany would have
gone against Allies if the Allies
really had proved victorious and
were not afraid of Germany. That
persuasion is the great obstacle to a
clear understanding between the
Germans and their conquerors.—
Toronto Telegram.

MANY FAIL AMONG BACK-TO-LANDERS

The President of the United States
Federal Land Bank of Springfield,
Mass., says that of farm borrowers
who were from thirty to sixty days
late in paying their interest a very
large majority were found to be men
who had come from nearly every
walk of life, lawyers, salesmen,
preachers, machinists, railway work-
ers, and so forth. They bought their
farms, which were generally fairly
good property at the time of pur-
chase but almost from the start were
unable to succeed. Not all these so-
called "back-to-the-landers" have
failed by any means. However, the
odds seem to be strongly against
them. They lack experience not only
in the management of the farm, but
in how to perform the hundred and
one operations incident to a farm
business. They have been used to
working for others and cannot work
for themselves.

These so-called "back-to-the-land-
ers" also fail because they do not
have the thrift and economy of their
neighbors who have lived on the
farms all their life. Farming is a
business conducted on very close
margins, and only by the saving of
little things can one succeed. Again,
these newcomers make unwise invest-
ments in machinery, tools, sometimes
in live stock. They have no sense of
proportion about how much labor is
required or when it should be per-
formed.
