THE ARMY WORM

Prof. George E. Sanders, Dominion Entomologist, states that 1-5 of the grain crop in Queens County is infested with the Army Worm. The pest has also been found in Kings, Colchester, Annapolis and Yarmouth counties. It is a dark colored worm, 1-2 inches in length. Owners of grain fields should plough a back furrow against them, as deep as possible, and dig a post hole, 1 foot deep in the furrow, this protecting the clean fields from those infested. The march is generally from the grass to the grain field. The last two infestations of Army Worm were in the years 1879 and 1914.
