On Saturday afternoon, Sept. 19th, a tennis tournament was played on the Round Hill court between Lawrencetown and Round Hill Tennis Clubs. Round Hill Club won out by three events. After tennis a luncheon was served on Mrs. Robinson's lawn.

The carcass of two moose have already been brought into the Bridgetown market this season. The first one was killed by Mr. Norman Buckley, of Dalhousie, and the second by Mr. Harry Egan and Mr. Freeman Shipp.

There was taken through St. John on last week a shipment of apples and sheep from Nova Scotia, which attracted some attention because of the fact that they were being forwarded west. There were forty carloads in the consignment taken on its way to Winnipeg. The sheep took up ten cars.

MEETING OF RATEPAYERS

I hereby give public notice that a public meeting of the ratepayers of the Town of Bridgetown will be held in the Council Chamber in the said Town of Bridgetown, on Wednesday the 30th day of September, A. D. 1914, at 7.30 o'clock in the evening, under section 143 of the town's incorporation act and amendments thereto.

At which meeting there will be submitted to the ratepayers for approval a proposed expenditure of a sum of money not to exceed the sum of three thousand dollars for the purpose of building an extension to the town's sewerage system on Granville street east, in the said Town of Bridgetown, to connect with the present sewerage system of the town at the Revere street extension.

At the same time and place and immediately after the vote is taken upon the proposed expenditure for sewer extension, there will be submitted to the ratepayers for approval a proposed expenditure of a sum of two hundred dollars for the purpose of extending the present water system of the town on Granville street west to the property owned by the "Valley Park Farm, Limited."
