Dominion during last autumn and winter, the Bill was explained by lecturers of the Department of Agriculture and others, and generally discussed.

2. The principal information from farmers has been obtained through the lecturers at the above meetings, who report that at those meetings resolutions approving of the Bill and urging its passage at this session were, with hardly an exception, unanimously passed. Some copies of resolutions in the same sense, passed at the meetings of Farmers' Institutes or farmers' associations, have also been received by the depart-
