

## Order Paper Questions

**Miss Coline Campbell (Parliamentary Secretary to Secretary of State):** 1. Since April 1, 1975, 27 applications have been received by the Native Communications Programme of the Department of the Secretary of State.

2. Although the information provided by organizations relating to the amount of funding requested is not received as formally declared confidential material, organizations generally tend to view it as confidential. It would be preferable therefore that the organizations be approached directly for the amount of funding requested. **Miss Coline Campbell (Parliamentary Secretary to Secretary of State):** 1. The film showings (October 22 and 23) referred to, formed part of the Canadian Film Awards activities. The Canadian Film Awards is a private organization, composed of various groups of professional Canadian film associations and funded, in part, through a grant from the Department of the Secretary of State. A final statement of costs for this year's awards has not yet been received.

**Hon. Mitchell Sharp (President of the Privy Council):** In so far as the Department of Industry, Trade and Commerce is concerned: 1. Bombardier Ltd. has received the grants or loans shown on the following table under Industry, Trade and Commerce programs. Payments for development of Export Markets "PEMD" total \$31,121.00 and are repayable as a percentage of sales resulting from the marketing activities supported. Payment for industry modernization "IMDE" total \$387,058.00, 50 per cent of which are repayable. Payments to share the cost of the development
