In the open air the cold was almost insupportle; no clothes being proof against it, nor any ercife fufficient to keep up the natural warmth. froze the eye-lashes, fo that it was impossible fee; and the difficulty of respiration became treme, from the coldness of the air. In the ods, the cold was fomewhat lefs fevere, yet e the men were afflicted with chilblains on ir faces, hands, and feet. Even withinfide houfe, every thing was frozen, and hung full cicles. The bedding was quite fliff, and coed with hoar froft, though the beds were alft close to the fire. The water, in which the k foaked the falt meat, within doors, froze hin three feet of the fire. But during the ht, when the fire was neglected, all was C 3 frozen
