The event has confirmed my convictions in an eloquent manner, and although the extremely valuable negotiations undertaken by command of your Holiness have on account of special circumstances not succeeded in obtaining a result adequate to the loftiness of thought which inspired them, yet the Republic and its Government cannot fail to estimate at their true value the steps taken by the Holy See in this delicate question, and is bound to so bold and esteem them as if their efforts had been those which your Holiness anticipated and the Republic desired.
