## ERRATA ET CORRIGENDA.

Page 4, l. 10.—Substitute, for “2nd”, 24th.

Page 73 and 74.—For “Thibeauveau”, substitute Thibaudeau, also, note that the house of Thibaudeau Bros. & Co. originated in 1810, instead of 1811, and that, since the printing of this work was begun, the Hon. Isidore Thibaudeau, father of Alfred Thibaudeau, of Montreal, died, at Quebec.

Page 222, l. 12.—Substitute for “30th Jan.”, 30th April.

Page 413, l. 2.—For Rev. J. T. Dawson, substitute Rev. Benjamin Dawson—J. T. Dawson, a wealthy gentleman now in England, was one of his successors in business.

In the interval between these two new year's days, England appeared to be a year behind Scotland and was eleven days behind Catholic countries. As an illustration of the consequent inconvenience, Addison's Essay No. 21, in the *Spectator*, bore dual date, “Saturday, March 24th, 1710-11,” the “11” being complimentary to Scotch readers. The next day (25th of March) being both New Year's day and Sunday, the next Essay, No. 22 (by Steele), was dated Monday, March 26th, 1711, the year being then common to the two countries.
