NEWCOMER WINS STEEPLECHASE

Favorites Fare Badly on the
Holiday at Montreal—The
Summary at
Lafonia.

MONTREAL, June 3.—The holiday helped the Blue Bonnets' attendance today, about 600 people witnessing the races. The track was dry, but not dusty and the weather conditions were ideal. The steeplechase was the feature and was won by Newcomer, who was under restraint until the stretch, but then passed Irish Hag, who was carrying more weight and who tired in the last half mile. Lenape fell at the third jump, midway in the third round, at the thirteenth, at the eighth jump. Cotton lost his rider, Grady, who refused the tenth and going to his knees and losing a couple of strides. The favorites failed to come over in the last of the races, Irish Hag's victory in the fourth at 10 to 1 being a notable exception. 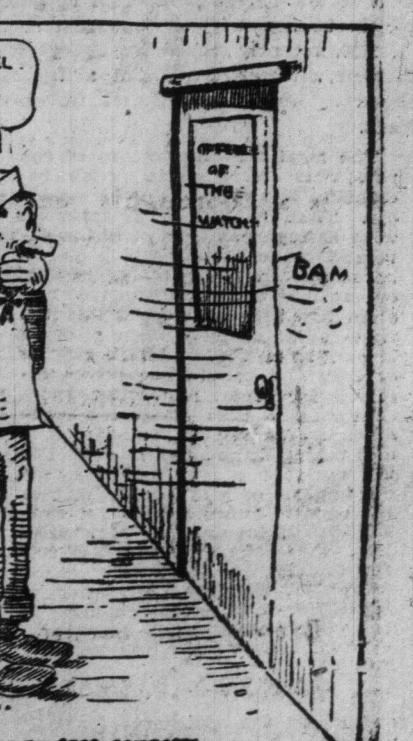
