LEAFS ARE BLANKED BY MCGRAW'S MEN

New York Nationals Score Five Runs in Exhibition Game at the Island.

The Leafs were not in the swim in the exhibition game with the New York Giants yesterday. Fiedler Schupp, of world's series fame, bowled over Dan's men in handy fashion, letting them down with three widely separated hits, and struck out eight Toronto batters. The Giants scored five times on Sam Lewis. The crowd was small, but the exhibition provided was well up to the average and the Leafs played snappy ball and hit like good fellows. Causey and Radden, who worked on Tuesday, did not accompany the team to Toronto. Sixteen players made the trip and twelve of them were in the game at some time or other. Ross Young, the sensational young outfielder and the former Rochester player, was the only regular outfielder to sit on the bench. He is nursing a sore ankle. Larry Doyle, Helme Zimmerman, Fletcher, George Burns and Money Gibson were well-known players that took part. Lewis did well with the big leaguers for four innings, and then four hits chased over as many runs for New York in the fifth and the game was over. Schupp held the Leafs safe at all stages. Wagner, Lear and Lewis were the only local players to try off a hit, and these could not be bunched.

Toronto's end of the doings was not conducive to raising any excitement for the local fans, and they had to be content with the scamping of the big leaguers. The fielding was just the average of the ordinary ball game, and the Giants went thru the day without a hit. They displayed plenty of ginger on the field. The four New York runs in the fifth came quick. Kike and Gibson grabbed hits, and when Schupp scored Gibson at second Kike scored. Burns rapped to left, but Wilhoit rolled out. Fletcher was hit by a pitched ball and Doyle's run to centre counted two more. Doyle and Fletcher pulled the double steal, the latter scoring. Nobody covered second, but take Fletcher's good throw and the Leafs looked cheap.

Schupp started to start the seventh and Wagner bowed Thorpe's roller. Wilhoit sacrificed and Schupp came in on Fletcher's infield out. This ended the scoring for the day. Wagner got his hit in the first, and as Callahan fanned Wagner was nipped trying to steal. Lear grabbed his hit, a double, with one down in the fourth. Nobody could bring him home. Lewis singled in the fifth, only to be forced at second by Anderson.
