MR. COCHRANE DEFENDS
HEALEY'S FALLS LEASE

Minister of Lands and Mines De-
nies That Bargain is Incon-
sistent With Govt. Policy.

The Globe in an editorial yesterday on the Healey's Falls power franchise declared that "the terms of the lease to the power company contravene the spirit, if not also the letter, of the law which governs the granting of water power franchises by the crown. According to that law the limit of the leasehold is ten years, renewable for another ten, and then for twenty; the Healey's Falls lease is for twenty years, renewable afterwards for ten, and then for another twenty. In other words, the duration of the first lease is doubled in defiance of the law as it has stood for several years past.

Mr. Cochrane's Denial.
The attention of Hon. Frank Cochrane, minister of lands and mines, was yesterday called to the above criticism and he characterized it as rot. The construction put upon the matter, he said, was untrue in every sense of the word. The bargain which had been made was a splendid one, he maintained, calling upon the company to develop the fall, and giving the power at Healey's Falls, and the government would regulate the prices.

Greatest Holiday Crowd
Invaded City Yesterday

Streets Presented an Appearance of Business and Merrymaking Activity That Constitutes a Record—Over 100,000 at the Fair.

The fact is that if the government produce more energy than it is at any time developing no other authority can be brought to bear on the company, and if the government fixes a price for electric energy, no matter how favorable it may be to the company as against the purchasers, whether municipalities or private parties, any order in council fixing such rate shall be final and conclusive, and binding on all parties concerned.

JOE GANS IN 42ND ROUND
