There is a cheerful feeling in trade circles, owing to the ful feeling in trade circles, owing to the larger advance in the price of wheat and the excellent prospects for the next crop. New clip wool has begun to offer, and 16 cents has been paid for all lets of washed fleece, but it is thought the great bulk of the crop will have to be sold at 14 cents or under. The woolen mills are busy and very firm on values. There is an active demand for hardware and metals. The movement to the Northwest of harvest tools is increasing. Hog products are in active demand for this season, and very firm, owing to moderate stocks. Groceries are moving more freely. Molasses is 1 to 11/2 cents higher; sugars are firm. The price of wheat has advanced in this market 3 to 5 cents the past week; flour is 10 to 25 cents higher, and coarse grains are firmer. There has been a demand here this week help and from the United States for chemicals that are contraband of war. Sulphur is quoted here 2 cents, against 6½ cents once, and in the American markets.

The local money market is still firm, and call loans are not much more easily obtained, but the prices of leading Canadian securities have advanced on investment buying. Trade in Manitoba is beginning to feel

the effect of the opening of navigation, and large supplies are arriving from the east. Manitoba dealers are likely to be free purchasers in the eastern markets for the next six months, owing to the greatly increased business prosperity of the west. The spring wheat crop is beginning to make its appearance above the ground, and the plants look quite healthy. The millers who hold most of the wheat that is left in the country—the stocks at the lake being only one-fifth of the amount in the elevators a year ago-stand to make all of the recent big advance in wheat prices, and that alone will mean a great thing for trade in this province. A good active business is reported in most lines at the coast, and values are very firm and the tendency is generally upward in most lines of staple goods. Wheat in Vancouver has advanced \$3 to \$4 per ton.
